Do you have a bit of wanderlust in your bloodstream? Tired of seeing the same old places and same old faces every day?

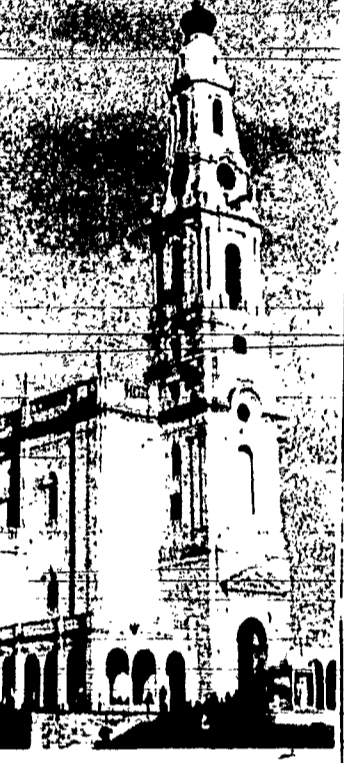
How about a trip to Fatima this spring or to the Holy Land in the autumn?

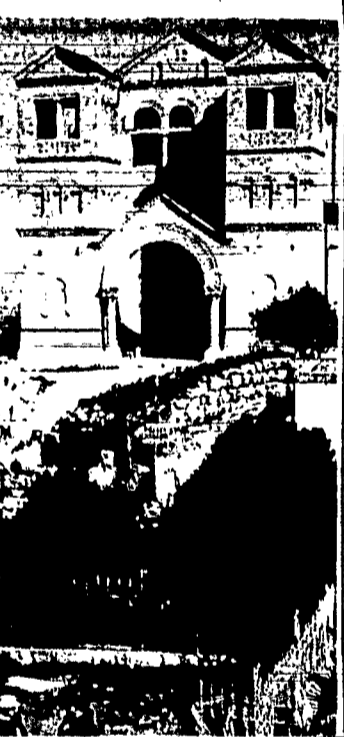

HE WAS an active member of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, the Legion of Mary, the Laymen's Retreat League and Sacred Heart Cathedral Men's Club.

Mr. Collins joined the Lincoln Rochester Trust Co., August 1, 1925 as a messenger. He was a member of the American Institute of Banking, Rochester Chapter and was active in Boy Scout work.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Agnes Rumble Collins; two sons, Father Robert L. Collins, assistant pastor of St. Monica's Church and Joseph M., an Aquinas Institute student; two daughters, Eileen M., at home and Sister Francis Joseph, of the Sisters of St. Joseph; three sisters, Mrs. William Deisera, Mrs. Albert Quechenbach, Rosemary Collins, three brothers, Edward C., Robert E. and Charles A.; two aunts, Miss

Grace Courneen and Mrs. Margaret Collins; several nieces and nephews.

Father Robert Collins gave the blessing at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery assisted by priests of the Cathedral and the diocese.

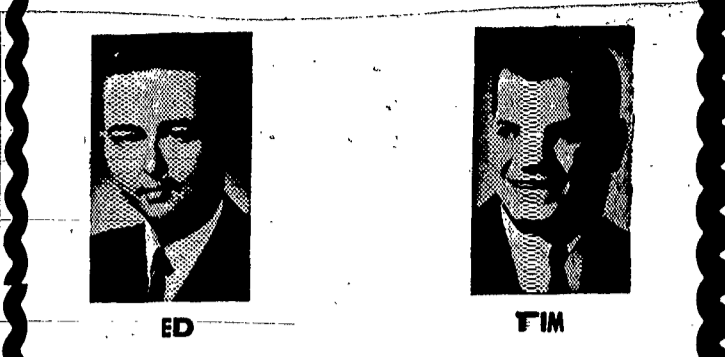

New York — (RNS) — The new open discussions among the nation's religious leaders on the ecumenical implications of the church-state issues to be treated by the New York Constitutional Convention in April.

Jesuit Father John Courtney Murray, one of the leading Catholic theologians and director of the LaFarge Institute, described the discussions as having a double purpose:

"We hope to head off the damaging effect to ecumenical and interreligious relationships which would come if controversial issues arising over church-state issues at the Convention. By discussing the situation beforehand and providing a means for various viewpoints to be discussed openly, we hope to establish one
