


## **Ecumenical** Feared at Co

New York - (RNS) LaFarge Institute has open launched a series of closed-door inte discussions among the nation's religious leaders on the ecumenical implications of the church- disc state issues to be treated by the wou New York Constitutional Convention in April.

Jesuit Father John Courtney tain Murray, one of the leading Cath-such olic theologians and director of tran the LaFarge Institute, described as t the discussions as having a pi double purpose:

"We hope to head off the new damaging effect to ecumenical and interreligious relationships which would come if contro pan versy arises over shurch-state of issues at the Convention. By discussing the situation beforehand and providing a means for various viewpoints to be discussed lim openly, we hope to establish one
