

Meet Miss Rochester Margaret Travers

Louise Wilson, Women's Editor of Station WHAM, is heard eleven times weekly: 9:10 and 9:25 a.m., Monday through Friday; 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

The competition was extremely keen. The contest too close for comfort yet she won and the judges' decisions, by secret ballot, met with popular approval. She is Miss Rochester 1967 otherwise known to family, friends and students at Monroe Community College where she is a freshman as Peggy. "I hope to become a history teacher," she says, "but it may take me quite a while."

This hazel-eyed brunette in the evening gown part of the Miss Rochester-Miss America competition wore a floor length gown of flame chiffon with a silver jeweled necklace, silver gloves and shoes.

In the talent part of the lively competition, Peggy Travers did a dramatic portrayal of St. Joan before her inquisitors. Brother Heathwood, drama director of Bishop Kearney had coached her. Her English professor at Monroe Community had suggested the reading. The surprising part of this portion of the competition was that this was Peggy's first attempt in dramatic reading.

To win the whole contest was as Peggy puts it, "a definite surprise. It didn't hit me that I had won until everyone was taking pictures and the current Miss America, Debbie Bryant came up to me. Then it began to sink in that I really had won."

Was she nervous? She recalls that her mother was "I just told her (even though it was kind of cute for her to stand there looking awfully nervous) that I wouldn't take her to Oleon for the regional competition in August if she kept it up."

How has life changed since she became the new Miss Rochester? "It hasn't changed that much. People keep asking 'Don't you feel different?' I tell them that it's the same Peggy Travers. People think my title makes me different, that bothers me." One of a family of five children, Peggy willingly discusses any questions put to her:

WHAT'S YOUR MAKEUP PROGRAM? "In the daytime I wear no make up at all except a little lipstick. For evening, I wear a little blush. A little eye liner under the lower lashes only. A little mascara and that's all. I do use a cleanser and soap and water twice a day. I follow the cleansing with a moisturizer."

WHAT ABOUT YOUR HAIR? "I wash it twice a week and usually set it myself on large rollers in the afternoon and it's dried and ready to be combed out long before I go out. I use a liquid shampoo. For the

Pageant, however, I went to the same hairdresser as Debbie Bryant. He suggested I use listerine mouth wash in the rinse water to 'make' my hair shine. I've tried it but I don't notice any big difference. Maybe it's just me."

HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT CLOTHES? "I love them—I usually shop alone and my mother hasn't told me yet that she doesn't like what I buy. For daytime, I usually wear something very casual. A skirt and sweater. Slacks or shorts with loafers. For dates it depends on where I'm going. If it's to a movie I usually wear a casual dress. To a party, again it depends on what type. It's usually either a dress or slacks. I do like the new pant suits and I have two: one a solid green which I like and a white bell-bottom suit which is just a little too 'mod' for me. I'm going to cut off the bell bottoms. I can sew just enough to revise my mistakes and that's about it."

And Peggy Travers herself is "about it" when it comes to all-girl competitions representing a wholesome, refreshing type of young lady, a credit to Nazareth Academy where she was graduated, Monroe College where she is matriculating, her family and station WOKR, sponsors of the local MISS ROCHESTER-MISS AMERICA competition.

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IFCA Plans 'Mary's Day'

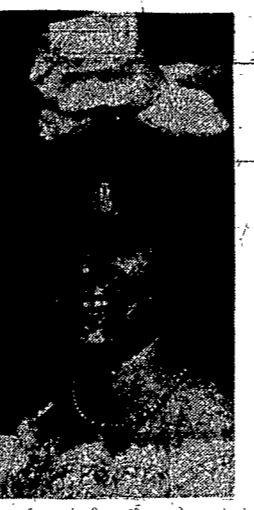
