I've alternated between the chair at my sewing machine where I've spent many pleasant hours fashioning my "travel trousseau" and my chair at the typewriter completing columns for you to read in our vacation absence in the Orient.

Here in my den, I'm nagged by the bits of thread and papers scattered on the floor. Pins that dot the carpet and snips of fabric that furnish further clutter. Over there on the sofa, my travel case has a wide open yawn like a sleepy child who's up long past normal bedtime. Through the window the forsythia buds are about to split their seams and the pussy-willows have long since burst their catkins. It's always this way. Spend a year anticipating a once-in-a-lifetime vacation and then at the last moment, home lugs hard at the arm. There's comfort in knowing that the last stitch has been taken for the trip that will take us to Japan, China and Thailand. Thanks to a clear friend who thoughtfully and tactfully selected all fabrics for me.

Sight unseen, patterns unselected, Dottie chose far better than I could have.

There's the beige and white da-cron-crepe easily made by following Pauline Trigrere's designer pattern for McCall's, No. 8501. A slim yoke dress with long set-in sleeves gathered into button cuffs. A wonderfully wild stained-glass print of da-cron chalis patterned after Simplicity's designer series No. 8901.

A washcloth. Bars of soap. Two pairs of sunglasses. A copy of Olson's "Orient Guide." One suitcase must hold everything. What doesn't fit stays at home!

A huge overseas bag which carries with all necessities for overnight flights also holds all the tapes I will use in the three countries. Two paperback books are also included for reading in airports before take-off time.

And that "take-off time" from Rochester airport will come very, very soon. And at most in so short a time, three weeks will have whizzed by and we'll have skimmed three countries. I can always tell when it's time to come home—when I start looking like my passport photo. Today—TODAY. TOMORROW—TOKYO.

### Principals Attend Meet In Boston

Sixty-five hundred principals and supervisors attended the Boston last week Sister Clare Francis, Immaculate Conception, Ithaca; Sister Rose Gertrude, St. Mary's, Elmira; Sister Joseph Andre, St. John's, Spencerport; Sister Mary Ellen, Our Lady of Lourdes, Rochester; Sister Mary Dorothy, St. Alphonsus, Auburn; and Sister Jean Baptiste, St. Lawrence, Rochester, participated in the convention.

Directions in Elementary Education was the theme of the week.

Doctor Robert Anderson of Harvard University spoke of the changing shape in elementary schools emphasizing trends such as team teaching, the middle school replacing the junior high and the importance of pre-school and kindergarten experience.

"School as we know it today is a dying institution," says Doctor Ole Sand, director, Center for the Study of Instruction, NEA, Washington, D.C. Schools are moving from group instruction to individualized instruction, the memory method to inquiry, from graded to non-graded, from teachers as general practitioners to teachers as team and clinical specialists, from teaching as telling to teaching as guiding, from a nine month year to a twelve month year with staggered vacation and time to think and plan. These are the trends seen by educators for the 70's.

A brief meeting was conducted after the ceremony. A donation will be made to the Holy Childhood School in Rochester and to the Red Cross-Community Chest drive.

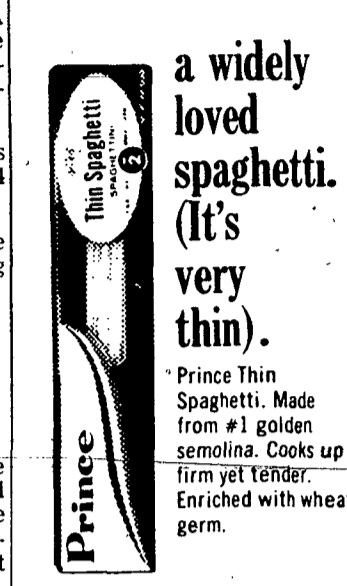
A Mass for deceased members will be said at 7:30 p.m. May 4 in St. Stephen's Church.

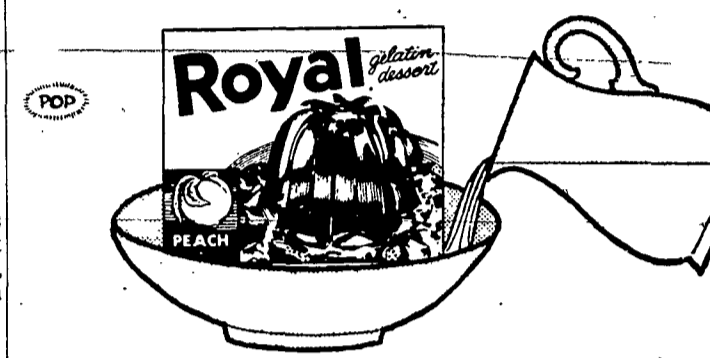

### Religious Education Discussed in Corning

Responsibility and initiative on the part of the laity were predicted during a panel discussion on "Parish Education—What's Ahead" at St. Patrick's Parish, Corning, on Friday, April 14.

The discussion was the feature of the quarterly meeting of the Southern Tier Region of the Christian Family Movement. The meeting was attended by approximately 175 people from Corning, Ithaca, Owego, Horseheads, Elmira and Cornell University.

Participants on the panel included Monsignor William M. Roche, Sister Marietta of the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, and Joseph A. Mercier, Robert L. Meteyer served as moderator.

Monsignor Roche, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools, opened the discussion by pointing out that "We have taught in the Catholic Church for thousands of years that the parents have the primary responsibility in education but we have not implemented this idea."

Looking to the future, Monsignor said that the idea of continuing education will become more necessary as leisure time increases, and that this will of necessity include religious education.

He stated that he did not have any "pat answers" to the problems which confront us today, but before we develop answers, "we should begin this solution by discussion with those who are primarily responsible for education—the parents."

Sister Marietta, supervisor of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine for the Diocese, said that religious education was intellectualized and too "child-centered."

As a solution Sister suggested that a parish should form a religious education council made from the grass roots of

### Dr. Spock To Innocent

Cleveland—Here is Dr. Benjamin Spock, the noted authority on child care and development, talking about a child's disease that very few parents know about:

"We have statistics on rheumatic fever, but body can tell you the number of children crippled by prudence... Really, it ought to be listed in the medical book, Frejudice, Highly Infectious."

This is the unusual theme of an hour-long TV document called "The Victims," featuring Dr. Spock and produced by Westinghouse Broadcasting Company in cooperation with the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. The document growing out of a pamphlet, Spock wrote about prejudicial children, will be seen on TV stations throughout the country.

"There are pains of child that never come to light in routine examination," explains Dr. Spock, who is professor of child development at Cleveland's Western Reserve University and author of best-selling books on child care. "There wounds too deep to be seen the human eye... There's laboratory test that can diagnose humiliation. No gery that can clear up misery."
