The address was acclaimed by the audience and was accepted for publication.

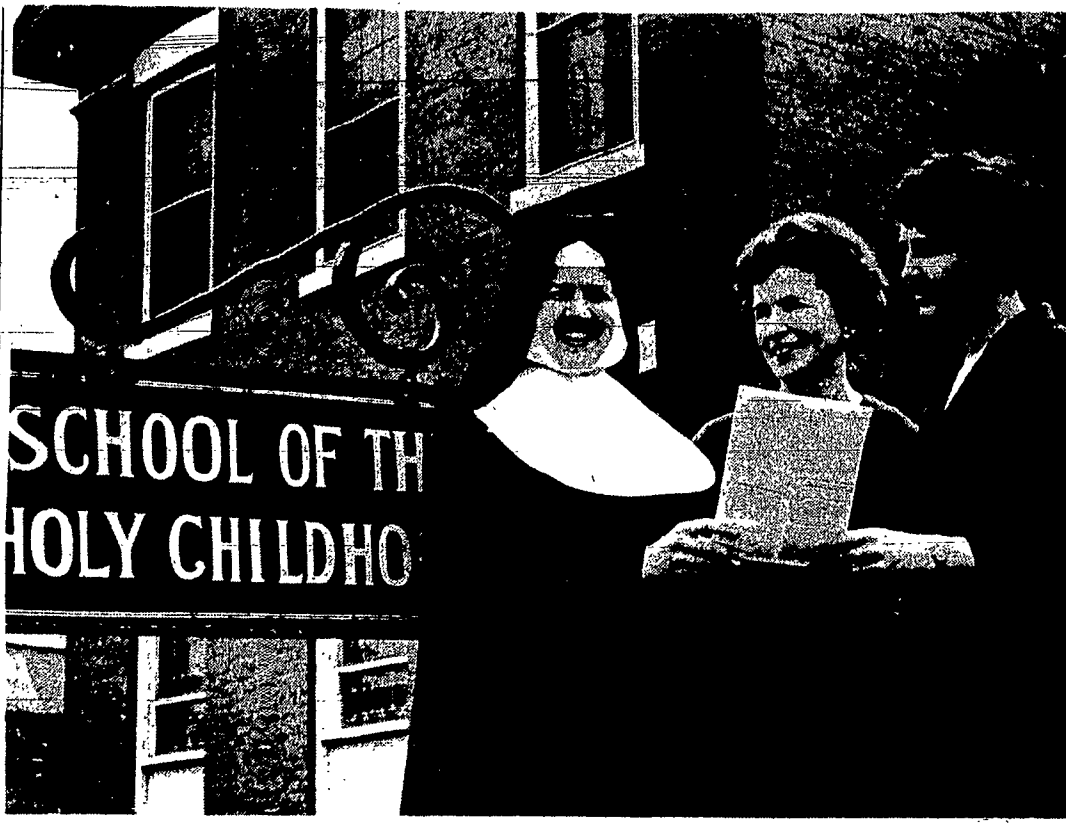

## State Honors for McQuaid

McQuaid Jesuit high school's debate society won 20 of 26 debates to capture top honors in Varsity, Junior Varsity and novice divisions at the New York State High School debate championships, held at the State University, Albany campus, from April 14-15.

More than 90 schools which had survived state-wide elimination contests, participated in the marathon state championships. McQuaid represented the Genesee District along with Bishop Kearney, Eastridge, R.L. Thomas and Aquinas.

A quartet of Sophomores compiled a record of 7-1 to take the state novice championship back to Rochester. Wins were scored over Christian Brothers of Syracuse, Hendrick Hudson of Montrose, Brooklyn Prep, St. Brendan's of Brooklyn, Union-Endicott, Beacon and Canisius of Buffalo.

The sole setback came at the hands of Xavier of New York City. Members of the state championship team are Richard Dollinger, 165 Ambassador Drive, Brighton; James Keenan, 61 Poplar Way, Brighton; Kevin Lucas, 23 Ros. Brook Drive, Penfield; and Alan Schreck, 350 Clover St., Brighton.

In the Varsity Division the team of Joseph Combs, 1617 Scribner Rd., Penfield; Kevin Hennessy, 83 Mayfield St., Richard Keely, 272 Elmdorf and James Welch, 25 Dyon Street, went 6-2 in preliminary competition to advance to the state quarterfinals.

Wins were scored over Columbia East Greenbush, Bishop Kearney, Beacon, Christian Brothers, St. John the Baptist, both of Syracuse, and Champlain of Long Island. The two losses came from Cardinal High of New York and Sacred Heart of Hempstead.

Combs and Hennessy defeated the New York City champion, St. Francis Prep in the quarterfinals, only to bow to arch-rival St. Brendan's of Brooklyn in the semifinal round. As a result, McQuaid had to settle for third place in the state varsity division.

McQuaid's Junior squad of Thomas Kay, 1144 Elmwood, Thomas Kostizak, 225 Newcastle Rd., Patrick Hanahan, 338

Marlborough Rd., and Leo Pudup, 330 Paul Rd., Chili defeated Bishop Reilly of New York, Uniondale of Long Island, Colton of Buffalo, Convent of Syracuse, Cooperstown—and Bethlehem Central. Two one point losses to Regis and Champlain, who ultimately finished first and second respectively, put the McQuaid Junior Varsity entry into fourth place in the state with a 6-2 record.

McQuaid was the only school to place in more than one division and the only upstate school to win a divisional championship. The state finals cap the best year in the Campion Debate Society's history, in which McQuaid has won six major tournaments and placed no worse than fourth in 18 others. The Society has won over 80 per cent of its debates.
