Ecumenical Retreats for Clergy, Laity

A new venture in ecumenical activity will get underway at new Notre Dame Retreat House overlooking Canandaigua Lake late in May.

A four day colloquy for Catholic and Protestant clergy will be held Monday, May 22, through Thursday, May 25.

A weekend seminar for Catholic and Protestant lay people will then follow on Friday, May 26, through Sunday, May 28.

Redemptorist Father Richard Moran said that the two programs will be conducted by the Faith and Culture Institute of Boston, an associate agency of the Ecumenical Institute of Chicago.

Franciscan Father Sigmund Dragastin recently described the Institute's program as "a new form of religious education... a task force building a human community."

Redemptorist Father Gerald J. Whelan has been named rector of Holy Family parish at Canandaigua. Sisters of Mercy

Centenary Marked, Auburn

This year the Rochester Diocesan Sisters of Mercy are marking the 100th anniversary of their mission in the city of Auburn.

Their early coming was marked by great sacrifice and hardships as they took up their duties of visiting the men's prison, giving instructions in the women's prison, and attending to the sick and infirm.

Opening event of the centenary celebration was the Sisters' Concert given April 23 at Central High School.

The five pioneer Sisters came

to Auburn in 1867 at the request of Father Thomas O'Flaherty, pastor of Holy Family parish. The school house was a converted church built in 1820. The first nuns were Sisters M. DePazzi, principal, M. Gertrude, M. Angela, M. Ursula and M. Veronica.

The second school, a brick structure, was erected on Chapel St. in 1873. By this time attendance had reached nearly 600.

The present school was built in 1928 by Monsignor John A. Conway and in 1930 Holy Family High School was officially

opened. Father William E. Davie was named principal in 1932.

Scoring 94.7 out of a possible 100 points, the Aquinas 17-man guard nosed out an excellent Sherburne Central School guard by 4 of a point. Third place was won by the Chessmen of St. Catharines, Ontario, while fourth place went to the Ufca Yankees. Bishop Kearney High School took fifth place. Fourteen guards in all competed.

Aquinas was all but assured of the top honor when it was announced that the local boys' school had won both the Best General Effect trophy and the

Best color guard commander award and trophy was won by Miss Kathy McGrail of the Blue Angels, one of Rochester's top all-girl drum corps. Best drummer award was earned by the Chessmen of St. Catharines.

More than 70 units are expected in the annual parade

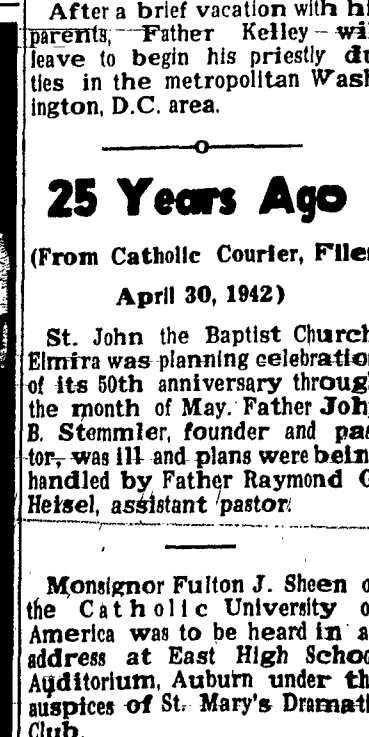
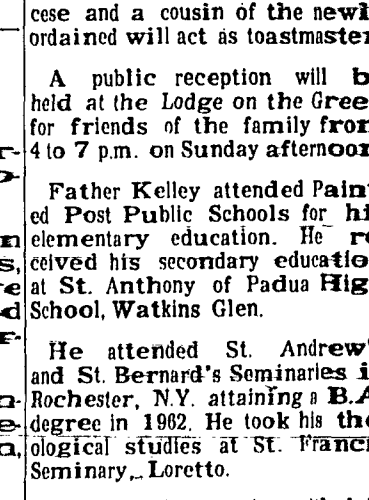
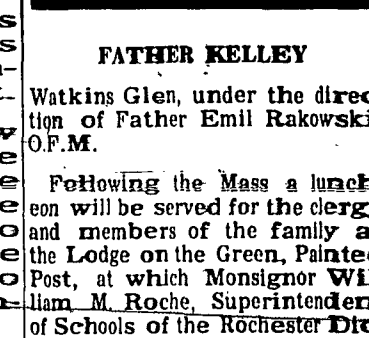
place trophy on behalf of his fellow students. Later Aquinas will receive a circuit flag, emblematic of its accomplishment.
