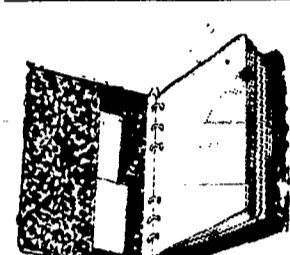
The film has been shown on several television stations and has received very favorable reviews from Time and America magazine editors.
