CHICKEN CASSEROLE
(Serves 6-8)

1 1/2 lb. stewing chicken
1/4 lb. Blue Bonnet Whipped Margarine
4 Eggs
3/4 loaf bread (1 1/2 lb. loaf)
1 can Cream of Mushroom Soup
1 can Cream of Chicken Soup
1 cup milk

Simmer the chicken in a small amount of water, salted to taste. When tender remove from pan; allow to cool slightly. Strain broth and reserve. Bone and dice chicken. Using 3/4 cup of the broth, acid melted Blue Bonnet and eggs, mix well. Dice the bread. Layer chicken and bread in large greased casserole until full. Pour the broth/egg sauce over. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Casserole should be a golden brown. Heat the two soups combined with the milk. Stir until smooth, serve piping hot in a gravy boat to be spooned as desired over individual servings. An interesting flavor was obtained by sautéing onions and celery with the bread-chicken mixture.

PORK CHOP CASSEROLE
(6 servings)

6 Loin Pork Chops (3/4 to 1 in. thick)
2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper

1 large can dark cherries
Whole almonds

Drain cherries and add enough water to cherry juice to make a quart of liquid. Bring to a boil. Pour over Royal Lemon Gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. Cover bottom of mold with gelatin; when it begins to set, arrange cherries which have been pitted and stuffed with whole almonds. Cool until set. CYO Camp

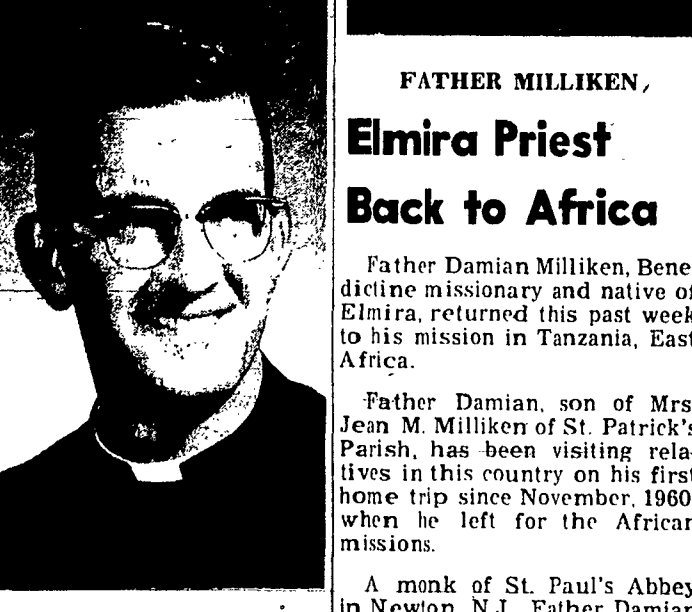

Father Damian Milliken, Benedictine missionary and native of Elmira, returned this past week to his mission in Tanzania, East Africa.

Father Damian, son of Mrs. Jean M. Milliken of St. Patrick's Parish, has been visiting relatives in this country on his first home trip since November, 1960, when he left for the African missions.

A monk of St. Paul's Abbey in Newton, N.J., Father Damian has been stationed in Tanzania for the past six years, and is returning to St. Francis Xavier parish in Lindi, Tanzania.

His sister, Miss Rose A. Milliken, is presently serving as a nurse and lay missionary in Lupaso, Tanzania.

In Wake of Hardy Dr. Lalonde

Gleaming Smiles in Africa

Dr. Paul S. Lalonde, widely known dentist and missionary has returned in good health from his latest mercy travels across Africa.

This year, he told the Catholic Courier, he has been successful in bringing relief to natives of both East and West Africa. In most places, he said he found hospital equipment and accommodations at a high level.

In spite of political and economic problems being faced in various areas of Africa, things are progressing generally. However, he found that sickness and disease among the people are ever present and presenting the need of trained medical personnel.

In Ndarida, Tanzania, he found the hospital which had been completely destroyed by an earthquake some years ago, completely rebuilt. He cited this as a glowing tribute to the sacrifice and dedication of the Medical Missionaries of Mary, Irish Sisters, in charge of that hospital.

On this trip, Dr. Lalonde had been practicing dentistry since the first of the year in many hospitals and under varied conditions. Next year he will return at the beginning of the year.

He was enthusiastic over plans for a new hospital in Ibadan, Western Nigeria to provide a complete clinical dental department. The new structure will have provision for two additional dentists whom Dr. Lalonde hopes to recruit in this area. Equipment and supplies, X-ray equipment and drugs will be needed for the project and Dr. Lalonde will ask for donations by interested persons.

He will be glad to hear from any dentists interested in the medical missionary program in Africa and from donors of hospitals and from donors of hospitals.


