

## Aquinas Champ Looks Forward To Golf Career

Persons not particularly poetic went to the rhyme when a 16-year-old boy shoots a 63 on the Brook Lea golf course, not to mention a record-setting 29 on the back nine.

And if a prose writer's attempt at iambic pentameter is not overwhelmingly impressive, the following facts about Terrence Jeffrey Diehl, Aquinas senior, might be:

The six-foot, 180 pound offspring of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Diehl is defending New York State Junior Golf Champion, an honor won in 1964 and again

named Jack Nicklaus. In 1965, after Terry had won his first New York State Junior Title, he checked in among America's finest teenage golfers at Houston, Texas. Diehl walked away with the national driving contest. His winning drive was 320 yards.

More recently, the Aquinas star participated in Miami, Florida's International Orange Bowl Festival. The result — a second place finish.

The local and national play of the youngster has not gone unnoticed. Twelve colleges, including Houston, Florida State, Stanford and three Big Ten schools have sought Terry and his tools. Diehl, however, has decided to pursue education and practice golf at the University of Georgia.

The talented Aquinas senior recently received an invitation to the Sunnehanna Open. This tournament is an invitation for the country's top flight amateurs — and that's all amateurs including the likes of Dowling Gay, Dean Bernan, and Rochester's Don Allen.

A professional golf career is the aim of Terrence Jeffrey. And in light of such convincing evidence one conjectures that, after "Armie's Army" has been disbanded, sportswriters looking for inspired alliteration might turn to Aquinas' own. Would you believe Terry's Troops? Or Diehl's Divisions?

## Aquinas Alumni to Honor Basilian Father Carter

Scores of Aquinas Institute graduates will gather June 11 to honor Father Cyril F. Carter, C.S.B., mathematics teacher and athletic director at Aquinas who is completing twenty-five years at the local Catholic boys' high school.

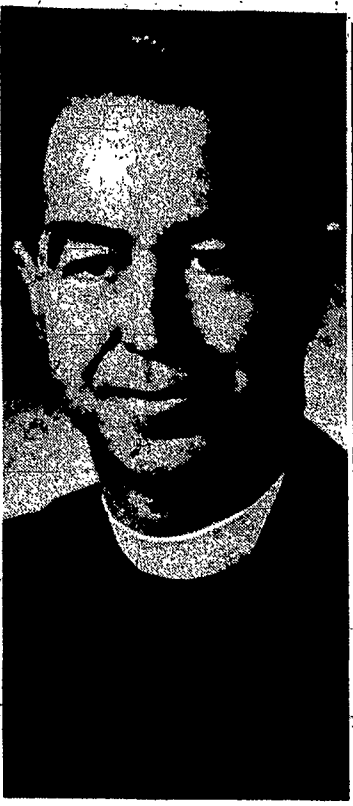
One of the best known and most respected priests in the Rochester area, Father Carter will be feted at a testimonial dinner at Vince's 50 Acres.

According to Al Schmitz, chairman of the dinner, "the alumni, recognizing the abiding influence of an outstanding teacher and dedicated priest, have singled out Father Carter who for a quarter of a century has taught those principles of cooperation and fair play that make all forms of human endeavor more meaningful."

Biggest problem for the committee, says Schmitz, was to find a hall large enough to accommodate the crowd. More than 7,500 students have graduated from Aquinas since Father Carter joined the staff. "We should be able to handle a quarter of that number but reservations must be on a first come, first served basis," Schmitz said. He added that early reports show an overwhelming interest.

Several nationally known sports figures are expected to attend the function, according to Schmitz.

Father Carter achieved renown and leadership in his youth, playing football, baseball

and hockey in his native Owen Sound, Canada, and later at the University of Toronto.

After ordination to the priesthood he was appointed to Aquinas in 1942 and was named to the mathematics department. In 1944 he became director of athletics and under his supervision the school became nationally known as a high school football power.

## Holy Name Tournament Rolls on Relentlessly

Phil Micchia paced the new leaders with a 679 series; Mike Lenzi, 659; Dick Stella, 619; Ralph Colangelo, 598 and Tony Lenzi, 549.

The Leco-Mist Five tied St. Ann's (Palmyra) for the lead in the high team single game division with its 1119 handicap total; followed by Seak House No. 2, 1115 and the Beechwood No. 1 (Post Office), 1110.

Gold Seal Wins team follows the leaders, Leco-Mist Five (3085), in the high team three game scratch division with its 3019 total.

St. Ann's (Palmyra) leads in the high team single game scratch with 1070, with Seneca Lanes and Raymond Florist tied with 1042.

Dan Marinola, Hart's Service team of Buffalo, still leads with a high individual three game scratch total of 750; followed by Bob Zahn (Zgrox Toners), 698 and Gus Donovan, ABC Lanes (Auburn) and Phil Micchia

(Leco-Mist Five) tied with 679. Individual high scores were captured by Joe Weckesser (Morrison Morrison) who hit 278; followed by Alex Spiller (Bausch & Lomb), 288 and Joseph Leone (Leone's Furniture & Appliance), 288.

The 32nd annual tournament, sponsored by the Catholic Men's Bowling Association of the Rochester Diocese, and which began on April 15 continues through May 7, 1967 at Marasco Bowl, 2121 Goodman St. North, Rochester, according to Fred Enders, secretary and tournament manager.

## Track Season Begins For Catholic Schools

The track season opened for the four Rochester Catholic schools last week. Bishop Kearney looked especially strong as they battered Churchville-Chill and Rush-Henrietta, before losing a comparatively close meet to Webster.

McQuid won their first two meets of the season, while Cardinal Mooney split a pair. Aquinas lost to Webster in its initial meet, and then turned in some strong performances in a Toronto, Canada, meet.

Cardinal Mooney split its first two meets, losing first to Webster (68-50) and then topping rival Greece Arcadia (8-37).

In the Webster contest, Earl Lenhard was a double-winner with victories in the low hurdles and the triple jump, while teammate Jim Harrington captured both the triple and long jumps.

Against Greece Arcadia Dan Polansky set a school record in the two mile with a time of 10:23.3. Lenhard set an Arcadia track record in the triple jump with a leap of 41 feet 5 inches.

McQuid Jesuit won a pair of meets last week as they dropped Greece Olympia (30-37) and Canisius High School of Buffalo (54-40).

In their shelling of Olympia the Knights took nine first places including wins in the mile and half mile relays.

Bernie Ashley took a pair of first places (100 yard and 220) against Buffalo's Catholic city champions, but McQuid had to win both relays in order to win the squeaker. Going into the relay events the Knights were

behind 46-44. It was victoriously vital for McQuid to win both races.

Kearney

Bishop Kearney trounced the track squad of Churchville-Chill (75-34) and Rush-Henrietta (72-29), but sustained their first loss of the season when powerfully Webster downed the Kings by 67-51.

It was a great day for double winners in the Chili meet as Kearney's Laverne Dickinson captured the 100 and 220 dashes, Jim Neary won mile and broad jump events, and John Numetko won the triple jump and high jump. Neary's leap of 21 feet in the broad jump was a school record as was the 5 foot 10 inch high jump and 43 feet 7 inch triple jump of Numetko.

Aquinas

A 70-48 loss to Webster opened the season for Aquinas last week. Webster dominated the field events picture, and on the whole Aquinas was able

to take only four first places. Jerry Schrot captured the low hurdles, Mike Gruttadara took the 100-yard dash, and Dick Fitzharris strode to a 10:10.9 victory in the two mile. The Aquinas medley relay team also won.

The L'il Irish found international competition a lot more to their liking as they entered a partial team in a Toronto high school meet and managed to grab five first places. Aquinas entered only eight events.

Don Hall sprinted to a 10.2 victory in the 100 yard dash, Bob Tesla ran a 2:05.8 in the half. Joe Wargo and Dan Holden took first place in the mile and two mile runs respectively. Aquinas also won the mile relay in a time of 3:48.7.
