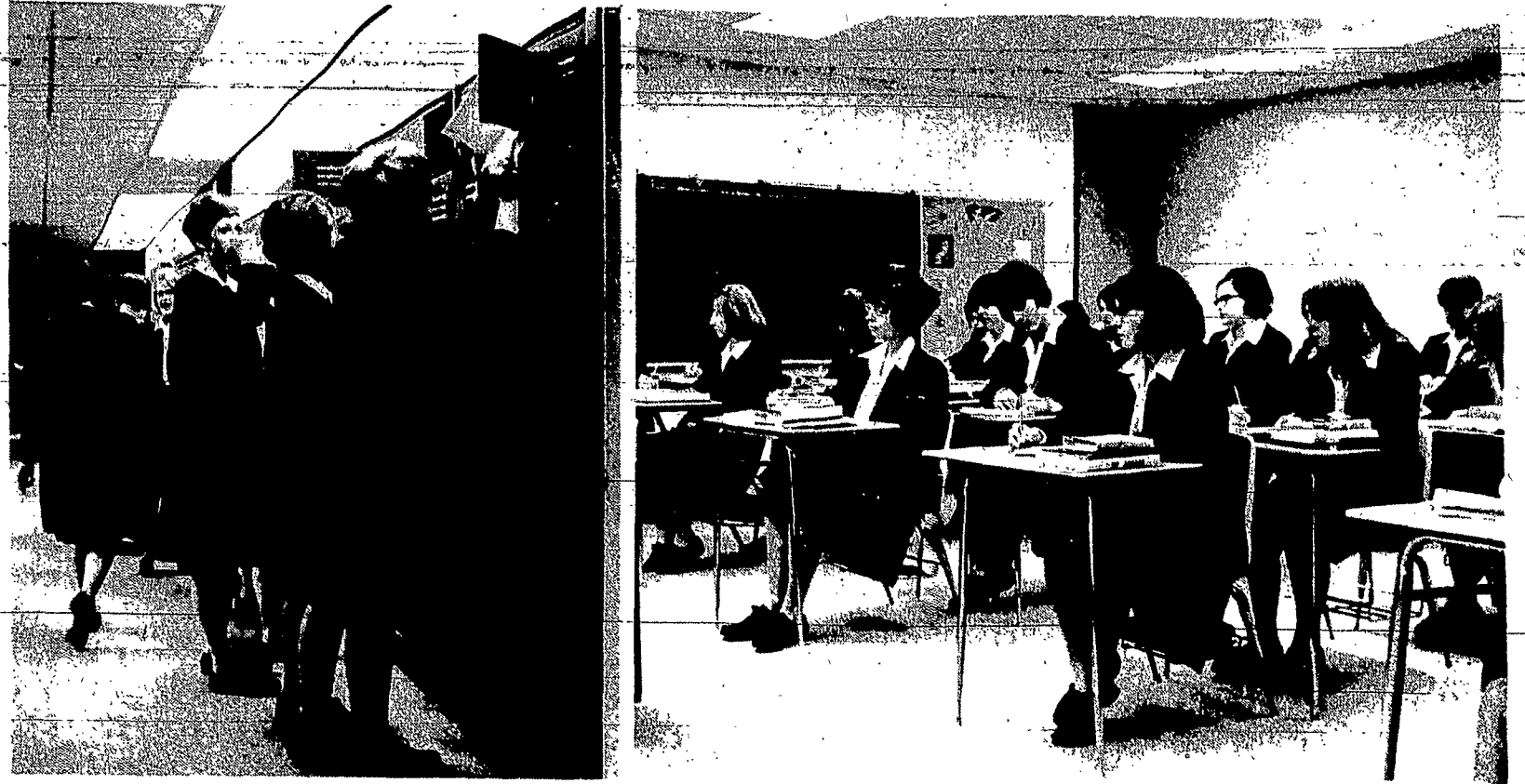

Business School To be Dedicated

Bishop Kearney will dedicate the new six-story St. Joseph Business School this Sunday, May 7, at 3 p.m.

The school will then be open to the public until 5 p.m. Begun in 1964, the school has long been known in Rochester for the competent training it gave its students in business and commercial subjects and procedures.

The school this year has grown from a three-year course of study to a fully accredited four-year high school.

Present enrollment is 218 young women. Sister M. Bernardine of the School Sisters of

Notre Dame is principal and Redemptorist Father Leo Dunn is chaplain.

ASKED WHAT is the "philosophy" of St. Joseph's Business School, Sister Bernardine said:

"The purpose of St. Joseph Business School briefly, is to prepare Catholic girls for this world and the next. In other words, courses will show how to earn a living with marketable skills and how to use the things of earth to gain the things of heaven.

"Unprecedented demand by business for secretaries, stenographers, bookkeepers and general office workers offers us a tremendous challenge. This challenge will increase in the years ahead. The school, therefore, recognizes its serious responsibility to train competent office workers and to educate the whole person to understand the functions of business in American society. It has kept pace with the changing needs of the business world and its demand for excellence.

"Our purpose is not only to prepare students for a career in the business world, but above and beyond that, to make them responsible and interesting persons, with a capacity for contributing to society."

Two Parishes To Vote on Merger Plan

Parishioners of St. Cecilia's Church and St. Peter and Paul's Church, Elmira, will ballot Sunday to decide whether or not to merge their parish schools in what could be a pilot project for the Diocese.

According to a proposal made by the pastors and school principals of the two parishes, first through fourth grade pupils would attend St. Cecilia's school; fifth through eighth grade pupils would attend St. Peter and Paul's school. This would eliminate doubled grades in the present separate arrangement. Pupils would be bused from one area to the other as needed.

Monsignor Philip McGhan is pastor of St. Peter and Paul's Church and Sister M. Jonathan is principal there. Father E. Leo McMannus is pastor at St. Cecilia's and Sister M. Seraphim is principal.

Army Looks For Priests

The U.S. Army is short 233 Catholic chaplains. Father Gerard J. Geffel told the Courier this week.

He is a Lieutenant Colonel at the Chief of Chaplains office in Washington and has served military units around the world including, most recently, in Vietnam.

He said the number of priests lags far behind clergy of other denominations in existing as chaplains. One denomination has provided 250 per cent of its quota, he said.

Father Shamon Jubilee Sunday

Father Edward A. Shamon, pastor of St. Aloysius Church, Auburn, will celebrate a Mass of Thanksgiving Sunday, May 7, at 12:15 noon to mark his silver jubilee as a priest.

A reception will be held at Mt. Carmel High School auditorium that same day from 3 to 7 p.m.

FATHER SHAMON, a native of Auburn, is today one of its best known clergymen. He has been in frequent demand as a speaker at civic as well as at religious events — such as at United Fund Drives, for Hampton College, for Auburn's high school graduates, and at ecumenical rites in Auburn and for the churches of southern Cayuga County.

He is also active on various community projects and serves as a member of the Cayuga County Catholic school board, the County Health Association and president of the County's Citizens Council.

Father Shamon has been pastor at St. Aloysius parish since 1962 and during the past five years has revamped the parochial school's educational program by eliminating doubled grades and adding lay teachers

to the faculty. He has also arranged for the purchase of a school bus to provide transportation for children otherwise unable to attend the parish school.

He has also launched a renovation of other parish properties.

Biographical details and a report of Father Shamon's other parish assignments will be reported in the May 19th issue of the Courier when a full story will be published on the silver anniversary of the 11 priests of the Rochester Diocese who were ordained in 1942.

Celebrating Sunday's Mass with Father Shamon will be his twin brother, Father Albert Shamon of Victor, and priest friends Monsignor Joseph O'Connor, Father Elmer Heindl, Franciscan Father Roland Jaskulski, Father Joseph D. Gorman, Father Robert Dalton and Franciscan Father Calude Zabinski.

Father Shamon is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Asad C. Shamon and attended St. Aloysius school, Auburn East High School, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries. He was ordained by Bishop Kearney June 6, 1942.

Miss Dantiza Costillo of Colombia, a Spanish instructor at Saint John Fisher College, will speak on the foreign student

program of the National Council of Catholic Women, and a group of students from Geneseo State University will discuss their involvement in a special program to bring injured Vietnamese children to the United States for medical treatment.

Foreign relief projects presented to workshop participants will be the "Feed-A-Family" plan, through which countless packages of food are sent to hungry families all over the world and the "Madonna Plan" which has set up maternity clinics in

Europe, Asia, Africa, and Central and South America, to provide medical care and proper nutrition to needy mothers and their children.
