### Henry F. Schmitz Rites, Father of Nun-Missioner

Auburn—Funeral Mass for Henry F. Schmitz, husband of Mrs. Helen Maloney Schmitz and father of Sister M. Loyola in the Sisters of St. Joseph mission in Brazil was offered April 20.

Mr. Schmitz, 87, of 4 Morris St. died April 17, 1967.

The Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by Father Theodore Schmitz and Father Michael Conboy, nephews of Mr. Schmitz and Father Merklinger in St. Alphonsus Church. Also in sanctuary were Monsignor Albert H. Schnacky and Reverend Fathers Henry Manley, C. Irvin Sullivan, John Quinn, Albert Cason, William Hogan, Albert Delmonte and Rev. Mr. Gerald Schmitz.

Mr. Schmitz was a lifelong resident of Auburn. He was graduated from Auburn Academic High School in 1917 and from the University of Pennsylvania in 1923. He was a Naval recruit during World War I.

She served as a social worker in the child placement department of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, 156 Plymouth Ave. N. from 1930 to 1933.

She attended Catholic University in 1933 taking social work courses for a year. Later she earned a theology degree from Providence College, Providence, R.I.

Sister Clementia entered the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1934. She taught in St. Monica's and Holy Apostles' schools and was later assigned to the faculty of Nazareth Academy for the first time in 1939. She left the academy in 1943 and was assigned to De Sales High School, Geneva and to Elmira Catholic High School before returning to the Academy in 1955.
