the ceremonies in the U.S., Portugal, Austria, the Benelux countries, France, West Germany, Ireland and Italy. In Canada, England and Scandinavia, highlights of the event were covered by delayed broadcast.

Bishop Sheen provided the commentary for the ABC television network for U.S. viewers.

The Communist-dominated nations of Eastern Europe did not cover the event on television, although at least one visitor from Russia, poet Yevgeny Yevushenko, was noted in the crowd.

The rain, which had been almost constant during the night before Pope Paul's visit, stopped briefly several times during his sermon and celebration of Mass.

The opening paragraphs of Pope Paul's sermon paid tribute to Mary and referred to the apparitions commemorated at Fatima, but the major portion of the address was devoted to the two-fold theme of the Pope's visit and prayer: Peace in the world and internal peace in the Church.

"In both the Church and the world, the pontiff pointed out new developments which have opened new vistas and produced a great increase in vitality but also involve dangers of division and conflict.

"The Ecumenical Council has revitalized the heart of the Church," he said, "has opened up new vistas in the field of doctrine, has called all her children to a greater awareness, to a more intimate collaboration, to a more fervent apostolate.

"We desire that these be preserved and extended."

But he warned of "terrible damage" which could result from "arbitrary interpretations" not authorized by the teaching of the Church, disrupting its traditional and constitutional structure, replacing the theology of the true and great Fathers of the Church with new and "peculiar" ideologies, "interpretation into an arbitrary and subjective manner, stripping the norms of faith of that which modern thought, often lacking rational judgment, does not understand and does not like."

"It is also a timely warning that they must try to avoid Hell, which is the loss of God and eternal fire.

"These are the truths of the integral part of the Christian message. Mary has always been a part of this message, but the celebrations of the apparitions of Fatima have given it greater immediacy and relevance."

The exhortation ends with the expression of a hope that the Immaculate Heart of Mary, "resplendent for all Christians as a model of perfect love of God and neighbor," may also be a sign of greater unity among all Christians and enable them to come together in the One Church of Jesus Christ.

"This is the Church of Jesus Christ of which Mary is hailed as the most loving mother," the Pope said.

heart of mankind still bursts with tremendous, continuous conflict. "Two conditions, therefore, render difficult this historic situation of mankind: it is full of tremendously deadly armaments, and it has not morally progressed as much as it has scientifically and technically.

"Moreover, a great part of humanity is still in a state of need and of hunger, while it has been awakened to the disturbing consciousness of its own need and the well-being which surrounds it.

The Pope asked prayers also for "those nations in which religious liberty is almost totally suppressed, and where the negation of God is promulgated as representative of the truth of these times and the liberation of the people, whereas this is not so."

"We pray for the faithful of these nations, that the intimate strength of God may sustain them and that true civil liberty be conceded to them once more."

Pope Paul concluded by commending to his listeners "the counsel which Our Lady gives us, that of prayer and of penance" in order that the world "shall never again have to face wars, tragedies and catastrophes, but the conquest of love and the victory of peace."

Later that same day and an ocean away, an "Americanism" parade in New York City drew a quarter of a million marchers "To Back our Boys in Vietnam."

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Included in the parade were two dozen nuns who recited the Rosary as they walked. Behind them were at least 100 other women doing the same.

Elsewhere in the parade marchers carried signs which read: "Escalate, don't capitulate," "My country right or wrong," "Burn Hanoi, not our flag" and "God bless us patriots."

had 80 converts in one year," the Bishop reported. He urged the new catechists to teach "the living faith... with very practical exercises in charity."

The Bishop's second new goal for the Conferencia is to prepare people to be not just teachers but preachers. To reach those the professional preachers, the clergy, cannot reach.

He also said that "God is telling us something" in the present evaporation of vocations to the priesthood. He cited the fact that once there were 740 bishops in northern Africa, today there are six; once there were tens of thousands of Christians, today there are 70 million Moslems. He attributed the Moslem triumph in large measure to laymen of that faith at a time when the Church was split by schisms, heresies and rivalries. He also pointed out that every Mormon man gives two years of his life to apostolic work. "Why are we so far behind them?" asked the Bishop.

He said he hoped someone would "provide a diocesan center to prepare laymen and laywomen to be preachers, not in the pulpits, but in the highways and byways and villages of this Diocese, wherever there are unchurched people."

Bishop Sheen's third new goal for the diocesan apostolate is "a new kind of retreat where small groups of 10 or 12 will read a passage of Scripture and then let the Holy Spirit speak to them" rather than the present method of one person going all the talking while all the rest listen. He said such a method "could change the complexion of our diocese and all its parishes."

He said the lay people of the Catholic Church are "the greatest untapped source of energy in the world" and challenged them "to implement" the proposals he made to them.

Our Lady's Message -- Prayer and Penance

Vatican City — (RNS) — The honor due to the Blessed Mother and the spiritual value of imitating her virtues are the two-fold theme of a 3,000-word papal exhortation sent out to all the Roman Catholic bishops of the world by Pope Paul VI.

The document, entitled "Signum Magnum" from its opening words in Latin, specified that "all those who believe in the Gospel" are obliged to venerate Mary.

The exhortation was issued in connection with Pope Paul's May 13 visit to the shrine at Fatima, Portugal, marking the 50th anniversary of the Our Lady's apparitions there.

All those who believe in the Gospel are obliged to render thanks to God Almighty," Pope Paul said in the exhortation. "God Almighty did wonderful things for the Virgin of Nazareth. They are also obliged to render to Mary all that is due to her in admiration, praise and filial gratitude."

The imitation of Mary's virtues "has particular importance within the framework of 'ecumenical thinking,'" according to the document.

Apparently referring to the statements given during the apparitions at Fatima, Pope Paul called them a "pure Gospel message."

Mary "seems to give an urgent message to the People of God that urges us on to fervent prayer, to interior and exterior penance, to the wholly respectful fear and love of God," he said.

"We are dealing, then, with a message that is a pure Gospel message because it causes the invitations of Jesus Christ to the Kingdom of God to be received."
