Liturgical Music Seminar

The Gregorian Institute of America, under the sponsorship of the diocesan music commission, Father Benedict A. Ehmann, chairman, and with the approval of the Bishop Sheen, will conduct a three-day liturgical music seminar at St. John Fisher College on August 30, 31, Sept. 1, according to Dr. Clifford A. Bennett, Institute President.

Present indications are that church musicians will attend in large numbers, not only from the Diocese of Rochester, but also from surrounding dioceses

and many distant centers. According to the latest report from the Institute's national office in Toledo, Ohio, there have been inquiries and requests for information from 37 states and Canada, and a substantial number of pre-registrations from outside the diocese.

A wide range of practical topics will be discussed by an eminent staff of Gregorian Institute faculty members. Institutes of lectures on the musical reformation set in motion by Vatican Council II and its implications in parish life and worship will be discussed and supplemented by practical illustrations by the Rev. Richard Wojcik, S.T.L., a member of the music commission of the archdiocese of Chicago and professor of church music at the major seminary of St. Mary of the Lake, Mundelein, Ill.

The unique, new liturgical music form, known as Verna Canto will be discussed by Wayne Belton, a former music supervisor of London. He will also demonstrate how present-day music forms may be applied to best advantage at choir rehearsals, to effect vocally correct, artistic and musical results within the limited time at the disposal of the average choir director and singer.

John Grady, organist of the United Nations Holy Family Church, and organist of the Metropolitan Opera, Lincoln Center, New York City, will demonstrate the norms of service playing in the light of liturgical reform.
