Research in eye examination techniques to discover glaucoma has led to a new method of spotting patients who are in imminent danger of suffering a stroke.

Music Groups Present Spring Concert

Nazareth Academy was to present its annual Spring Concert Thursday, May 25, in the school auditorium, Lake Avenue.

Three choral groups, the band and orchestra featured classical and modern numbers with selections from musicals and movies.

The Persian Choir was listed in selections from Handel's "Messiah," and choral numbers from "The King and I." Chorale Belles, a group selected from the Persian Choir, were to sing Fred Waring's arrangement of the "Waltz of the Flowers" from the "Nutcracker Suite." Sheila Fullan and Virginia Fichera are soloists.

Among the Glee Club numbers were sacred and patriotic songs as well as "Could Have Danced All Night" from "My Fair Lady," Maureen Wheelahan, Irene Wolk, and Margaret Anderson are soloists.

THE BAND was to play the following selections: "If Thou Be Near" by Bach; the rondo from Mozart's "Concerto Number 2" for French horn with band accompaniment. Soloist will be Joyce Wilkes. Other numbers are "Beguine for Flutes" by Osterling; "Misty" by Burke with the alto saxophone solo played by Linda Bouchard; "Born Free" by Barry, the theme from the movie of the same name.

Also on the orchestra program are three selections from Clarke "Grieg Suite"; "Patriotic Song," "Solveig's Song" and "Sailor's Song." The "Overture" to Boieldieu's 1812 opera, Jean de Paris, provides a contrast to the closing selection, Frederick Muller's arrangement of tunes from the current Broadway musical, "Highlights from Mame" by Jerry Herman.
