Lions Club Presents Check to Staff Library

Six members of the Lions Club visited St. Mary's Hospital May 24 to bestow a gift of appreciation for services given on that date a year ago by three eye doctors on the St. Mary's staff.

On May 24 of last year, the three doctors visited Wayland, where the Lions were sponsoring a Free Glaucoma Clinic. Working with a team of eight volunteer nurses, the doctors examined a total of 596 persons for glaucoma.

The doctors, who asked to remain anonymous, subsequently cooperated with the Lions Club members in setting up similar free clinics in six other communities. To date more than 2,300 persons have received free examinations for glaucoma through the work of the clinics.

The gift presented to the hospital was a check for \$300 for the hospital's medical staff library to buy books for eye section.

The original eye clinic in Wayland was established through the leadership of John McGuire,

with late sleeps, wider use of good films and television programs, and even the "permission" to study as late in the evening as they need to!

Much thought has been put into the new Reception Day ceremony which this group will celebrate on June 17. None of the bridal effects of the traditional ceremony will be a part of this one — no long white gowns, bride's veil or attendants; instead, a very simple ceremony in the Motherhouse chapel will mark the day on which they don the St. Joseph habit for the first time.

Their habit, too, will be a brand new one. For the first time in 113 years' Reception Days for the Sisters of St. Joseph in this Diocese, this year's postulants will not be putting on the traditional, 300-year old style headdress with its white starched face linens and stiff gumples. Rather, they will receive the simple new headdress

which the Community now wears and which will change the new Sisters' appearance very little.

Another major break with tradition for this group is that they will not be receiving new "religious names" on Reception Day. Instead of Ann Brown's choosing a new patron saint and being known for the rest of her life as "Sister Philip Mary," she will this year simply add the title "Sister" and retain her Christian name.

This is in accordance with the new understanding of the religious vocation as a fulfillment of one's original Christian vocation, rather than a "casting off an old life for a new one."

Altogether it has been a memorable year for this group of Postulants; and if they continue with their Community in this "renewal and adaptation of religious life" as called for by the Vatican Council II, there will doubtless be even more meaningful changes in the future.
