Notre Dame of Elmira wound up its baseball campaign with a 9-7 record last week, blanking Watkins Glen, 3-0, dropping a tight 1-0 decision to Corning West and bowing out 19-2 in a loosely played fray with Southside.

Notre Dame invaded Watkins Glen and defeated the Finger Lakes club by a 3-0 count last week. Mike Campbell needed little support in pitching a two-hitter, and striking out seventeen. ND scored all its runs in the first. John Harris led off with a triple to dead center and scored on a wild pitch. Then Arnie Westervelt singled and moved to third on a passed ball and a wild pitch. Fran Pirozolo hit a titanic home run to center field for two RBIs. Campbell also had a double.

ND next lost to Corning West 1-0. Dave Havert and Dan McCarthy were involved in a real pitching duel, each allowing only five hits. Arnie Westervelt and Larry Comereski had two hits apiece for ND.

ND dropped its last game of the season to Southside, 19-2, in a real comedy of errors, with Southside coming in on a 1-0 lead. Notre Dame fourteen John Walker and Lynn Hughes combined for the victory for Southside.

St. Patrick's Dominates Elmira CYO Track Meet

St. Patrick's School captured all three trophies as some 380 members of the County parochial grammar school children participated in the Fifth Annual Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) track and field championships recently at Elmira's Eldridge Stadium.

In compiling an overall total of 102 points, St. Patrick's walked off with the Bishop Kearney Trophy, presented for the first time.

The award was presented to Sister Mary Xavier, school principal, by Father James Collins of the CYO Board of Directors.

Second place went to St. Peter and Paul School with 51 points, while Our Lady of Lourdes finished third with 39 points.

St. Patrick's retained possession of the "A" Division (seventh and eighth grades) Elmira K. of C. Track Club trophy with 62 points as compared with 26 for St. Peter and Paul's and 25 for Our Lady of Lourdes.

In the "B" Division (fifth and sixth grades), St. Patrick's captured the Elmira K. of C. Club trophy for the third time in four years with a 40-point winning effort. Defending "B" title, St. Peter and Paul's was second with 25, followed by St. Anthony's with 17.

The "A" and "B" awards were presented to St. Patrick's coach, Mrs. Barbara McInerney, by Allie P. Quatrano, meet director, and J. Arthur Kieffer, meet starter and CYO track commissioner.

Meet Stars Several boys and girls turned in double and triple performances to contribute to their team totals.

In the "A" Division, Joe Terzizi of St. Patrick's had a hand in helping his team earn 16 points. He won the 75-yard dash and the long jump, ran the anchoring leg in the 80-yard relay and was on the tug-of-war team that finished second in the finals.

Four girls turned in outstanding performances in the "A" Division. Janet Knox of St. Peter and Paul's dominated the field events, capturing both the long jump and the triple jump.

St. Patrick's Maria Marosek received three gold medals by winning the 75-yard dash and the sack race and by running the "anchor" in the shuttle relay. Mary Beth Biggs of St. Patrick's was a double winner with a 60-yard victory and winning anchor-leg in the 60-yard relay.

Teammate Ann Grady abetted Maria Marosek's team effort of 15 points by registering 14 as she ran the lead-off leg in the 60-yard relay and took seconds in the 75 and 60-yard dashes and the long jump.

In the girls' section of the "B" Division, Kathy Knox of St. Peter and Paul's was the

only double victor with top performances in the 40-yard dash and the long jump.

Two St. Patrick's boys were the only first place "doubles" in the "B" Division. Mike Ranich captured the long jump and ran the "anchor" on the shuttle relay team, while Joe Gimgrich won the sack race and ran the second leg on the shuttle relay team.

Monroe Captures Aquinas Relays

Monroe's men of mobile muscle raced to three first places in the sprint events while accumulating 28 points last Saturday to win the fourth annual Aquinas Relays. Aquinas finished with 19 points and second place honors; Bishop Kearney and McQuaid had 18 points apiece and were tied for third. Cardinal Mooney had four points.

Five Aquinas Relays records were set on the U of R track during the "so fine, sunshiny" afternoon. Monroe and Batavia both established a pair of new marks. Bishop Kearney set the other standard.

Monroe's Redjackets commenced the cinder show with a victory in the first event, the 480 shuttle hurdle relay. The team of Leon Bradshaw, Dave Carr, Nate Vickers and Leon Cooper snapped across the hurdles in a non-record time of :57.2.

The Interscholastic League champions followed with record setting performances in the 440 and 880 yard relays. The 440

quartet of Lamont Jarret, Carl Livingston, Nate Vickers and Willie Robert traveled the distance in :43.7 seconds, smashing the old mark of :44.5. The foursome of Jarret, Livingston, Roberts and Leon Cooper broke the old 880 relay record of 1:32.0 with a 1:31.7 clocking.

Bishop Kearney turned in a strong 7:53.1 showing in the distance medley relay, and thereby broke the old "best ever" by 7.4 seconds. Bruce Velan, Jim Neary, Ed Zimmer and Mike Kelly were the members of the record-setting squad. Kelly ran the anchor leg mile in 4:29.3 seconds, the fastest mile time for a Rochester Diocese runner during the outdoor season.
