Final Rites at Motherhouse**

Funeral Mass for Sister Ruth Schicker, of the Sisters of St. Joseph, who died unexpectedly in St. Ann's Home on Tuesday, June 20, 1967 was offered Friday, June 23, at the Motherhouse.

Requiem Mass was offered by Father Leo Lynch, assisted by Monsignor Albert J. Schneck. Also present were Monsignor Donald J. Mulcahy, Monsignor Gerard Krieg, and Father William Charbonneau. A group of nurses from St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, attended the funeral and formed a guard of honor.

Sister Ruth was the last surviving member of the original group of seven Sisters assigned in 1908 to undertake the founding of St. Joseph's Hospital. Sister remained at St. Joseph's, until 1939, serving in the capacity of supervising nurse, and later as X-ray technician. She was placed in charge of the infirmary wing of the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse in Pittsford from 1939-1945, and again from 1949-1956, returning to St. Joseph's Hospital during the four year interval.

Women Study New Format

In line with the directives to update lay organizations, the Board of Directors of the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women has voted to form a study commission for this purpose. The commission will review the structure, methods and effectiveness of the Council in this diocese, with a view toward partial or complete reorganization.

At the post-convention meeting of the Board, the following interim officers were elected to direct this study and to carry on existing Council projects: President, Mrs. R. D. Waterman, of Ontario; first vice-president, Mrs. Raymond Hensler of Rochester; second vice-president, Mrs. Charles Haight of Greece; Secretary, Mrs. Charles Miskell of Genesee; and Treasurer, Miss Laura Falley of Auburn.

At a meeting of these officers and interested Council members, procedures for the commission were outlined. A questionnaire was formulated to be sent to the presidents of all DCCW affiliates. This will evaluate the past usefulness of the Diocesan Council and the elicited suggestions for the future.

As a further aid in deciding the Council's future, the study commission was divided into 3 groups as follows: (a) those who wish to retain the existing Council structures with or with-

out some change (this group will not function actively until it receives a report on the Catholic Laity Study now being conducted by the Bishops Conference); (b) those who wish to separate from the National Council but retain the diocesan structure with or without some change; and (c) those who wish to form a totally new group—separate from the National Council, organized on a local level, and with complete changes in methods of operation.

Each group will study the various aspects of its proposed plan, and will offer practical suggestions for carrying it out.

Respective chairmen are as follows: (a) Mrs. Ronald Gledhill of 192 Eastgate Dr., Rochester (b) Mrs. Charles Miskell of 11 Second St., Genesee and (c) Mrs. Raymond Hensler of 415 Yarmouth Rd., Rochester.

Catholic women interested in working with one of these groups, should contact its chairman by July 15. They may also submit suggestions in writing.

The recommendations of all three groups will be presented to the DCCW Board of Directors at its September meeting. The vote of those present will determine the plan to be adopted.
