Con-Con Interns Named

Two of the 58 students from 38 universities and colleges who will serve in a new internship program with the 1967 New York State Constitutional Convention as announced by the local program's director, Father James C. Finlay, S.J., chairman of the political science department at Fordham University, are from Rochester.

They are: Alfred C. Aman, 292 Marion St., a University of Rochester student and H. David Sobie, 16 Standridge Ct., attending Syracuse University.

The interns will serve in Albany July 1 through August 31 providing administrative and research assistance to the convention leadership and committees. Their work experience will be supplemented with seminars in constitution making.

The program will be conducted by Fordham with \$80,000 in matching grants from the Ford Foundation and the Convention budget.

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Vatican Issues

Ecumenical Guidelines

Vatican City — (RNS) — A sacred things). While the limited sharing of sacraments between Roman Catholics and non-Catholic Christians in "emergency situations" will be permitted under new directives issued here by the Vatican Secretariat for Christian Unity.

The directives said that "emergency situations" would include times of persecution or times when there is a danger of death. At such times, it said, reception of sacraments will be permitted to non-Catholics if the non-Catholic person does not have access to a minister of his own faith, if he asks for the sacrament spontaneously or if he declares his faith in the sacrament.

Catholics are still forbidden to receive the sacraments from ministers who are not validly ordained, even in emergency cases. This exclusion, the document says, does not apply to priests of the Orthodox Churches. Formally, it applies at present to Anglican and Episcopal priests, whose ordination is not presently officially recognized by the Vatican.

A number of Catholic scholars have suggested, however, that the Catholic position on Anglican orders, established in the 19th Century, should be re-examined.

According to the new guidelines, non-Catholics are still forbidden to preach or to give Scriptural readings during the celebration of the Mass and Catholics are forbidden to participate similarly in non-Catholic services.

A non-Catholic may not act as the sponsor for a Catholic at Baptism or Confirmation, but may serve as a witness if linked to the Catholic by ties of blood relationship or friendship.

Local bishops and bishops' conference are given the right to authorize a variety of inter-religious activities for Catholics and the heads of Catholic schools, hospitals and other facilities are told to help non-Catholic clergy minister to members of their flocks who are in the Catholic institutions.

The guidelines, contained in the Secretariat's newly-issued and long-awaited Ecumenical Directory, make a crucial distinction between "Communitatio in spiritualibus" ("joining in spiritual things") and "Communitatio in sacris," ("joining

visible boundaries of the Catholic Church.

These "can manifest and strengthen the bonds which still bind Catholics to their separated brethren," the Directory says.

A set of guidelines offered to direct ecumenical activity notes that "a certain give and take" is necessary in ecumenical relations. It warns Church authorities that "in some places and in some communities, sects and persons the ecumenical movement and the wish for peace with the Catholic Church has not yet grown strong."

In such circumstances, it advises local bishops or bishops' conferences to "indicate suitable measures for preventing the dangers of indifference or proselytism among their faithful," but it adds an expression of hope that ecumenical spirit will grow to such an extent that "the need for special measures will gradually vanish."

"Among the elements which go together to build up and give life to the Church," the document notes, "some — even very many — can exist outside the

Vatican, UN Focus on Peace

Vatican City — (RNS) — The United Nations and the Vatican have two principal aims in common — maintaining peace and international security and promoting collaboration among nations.

This appraisal was presented by Msgr. Albert Giovannetti, permanent observer of the Holy See to the United Nations.

Speaking at a press conference here on his return from Geneva where he attended the second Pacem in Terris Convocation, Msgr. Giovannetti noted that all of the recent Popes have concentrated on the problems of peace and the development of nations.

Msgr. Giovannetti noted Pope Paul VI's visit to the U.N. on Oct. 4, 1965. The Pope, he said, appeared before the members of the General Assembly "as one who had nothing to ask but much to give if they so decided."

The Vatican official noted that U.N. Secretary General U Thant has constantly underlined the effect of the Pope's words. Msgr. Giovannetti maintained that the Pope's visit and address has awakened countries to the peace efforts of the U.N.



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
