





The ten girls and six boys are participating in a tuitionfree Biology Summer Workshop being conducted by Dr. Edward Gassner, chairman of the Fisher Biology Department and his staff. The group meets on Mondays and Fridays for six hours of lectures and experiments.

According to Dr. Gassner, the course is designed to provide a general intrduction to biology laboratory research techniques and is intended to encourage gifted young scholars to develop their interest and talents as early as possible in their academic careers. In addition to formal class work, each of the students will be involved in individual and group research projects.




