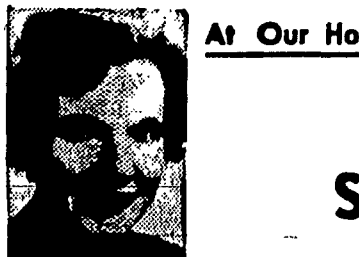

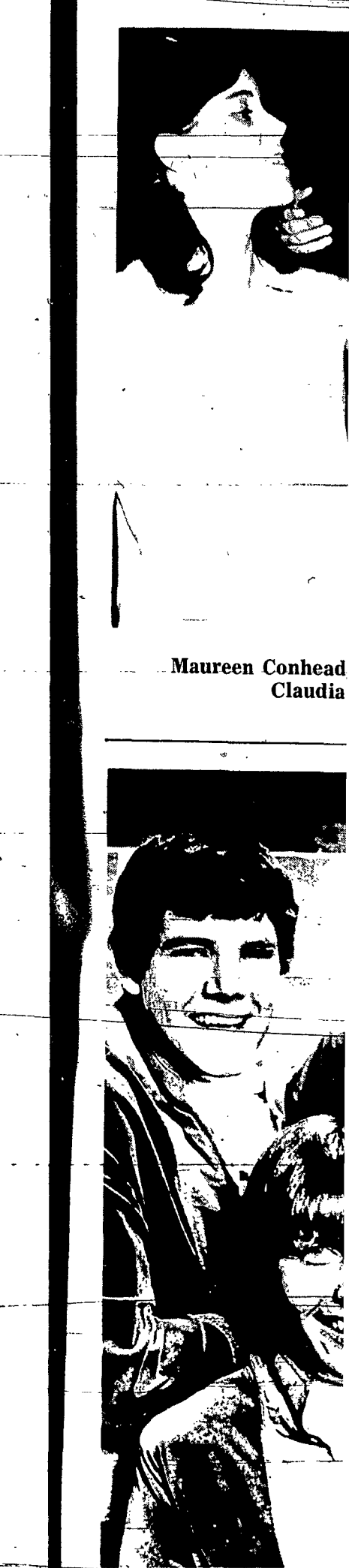
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## Will Ho Mean H

New York — Are modern lyrics immoral? That old question keeps coming back like a song, but today there is a refrain — namely, how teenagers are expected to refrain from experimenting with drugs when so many pop songs seem to be pushing the stuff.

The same moral concern that once used to be directed sexually suggestive or explicit lyrics in songs like "Love Is a Sale" or "I've Got You Under My Skin" is now turned towards titles like "Big Girls High," "Get Off of My Cloud," "Try It" and to single groups with names like "T Lovin' Spoonful" — all seen references to marijuana, heroin or LSD.

"Drug taking is nothing new to the music business," said a music-industry veteran, "but has always been a secret thing and practiced by a minority. Nobody went around boasting about it. But now I really get out of hand. Several of the most popular artists are quite free with praise LSD. They defend it by saying its effects are less harmful than booze. What happens is that untutored and uninitiated kids take the words of their idols gospel."

The pop-record problem is complicated by the fact that radio-station executives have trouble keeping up with the constantly changing line of the teen world. The British Broadcasting Company just had a new Beatles song titled "A Day in the Life" because it was suspicious of the lyrics "I'd like to turn you on."

The problem was brought to a surprising head recently when the president of the Dallas-based McLendon Corporation radio chain took a full-page ad in the record-industry magazine "Billboard," demanding that record companies supply him with a set of lyrics to every record they sent. He said he planned to set up a special "jury" of prostitutes, ex-prostitutes, junkies and ex-addicts help him translate the lyrics if necessary.

Although he and other executives have expressed concern about sexually suggestive lyrics also—the Rolling Stones' "Let's Spend the Night Together" ran into extensive censorship by disk jockeys—the prime concern appears to be lyrics which promote drugs.

If pop records make drug-taking attractive, said the radio chain president, Gordon "Lenny" London, "we've been just as guilty as those who do the pushing of drugs." He singled out a line in a new Beatles record that speaks of "40,000 purp
