# **Bias Survives**

### In N. Ireland

London — (NC) — Wide discrimination against Catholic in Northern Ireland to the point of equating their situation to that of the Negro in the United States was reported by a news team assigned by the London Times to investigate charges made by a promin entIrisharch itect.

Prof. Geoffrey Copcutt, who formerly headed a design team to lay out a new city to be called Craigavon, 20 miles south of Belfast, resigned from his post in 1964 in a disagreement over the location of the new municipal development.

In 1963 the Nor-thern Ireland government turned a deaf ear to pleas of the historic city of Londonberry to concentrate the new development there. Lon-donberry is 67.1% Catholic with a staggering amount of unemployment and resultant poverty Craigvon is in an area largely protestant.


The architect now visiting Andrew Mellon professor of -u-rban-design-and architecture at the Carnegie. Institute of Technology Pittsburgh, Pa., said he was told by a source close to the Northern Ireland cabinet that the government could not countenance any plan that would upset the voting balance between Protestants and Roman Catholics in the capital area.

# Church Burning Protested.

Jammu, India — (NC) — The Christian community here held a procession to protest the burning of a Catholic and a Protestant church in Srimagar on June 7 by a Moslem mob demonstrating against Israeli "aggression" in the Middle East.

The procession culminated in a pubic meeting where speakers condemned the burning of the churches and the arson and looting committed by anti-social and anti-national elements. They demanded severe punishments for the culprits and urged the Indian government to order an inquiry into the incident.

Earlier at a meeting of Chris tians, Premnath Dogra, a llindu leader and local president of the anti-missionary Jan Sangh Party, had called for a judicial inquiry into the attack and an investigation by the centra government.

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
