

Bias Survives In N. Ireland

London — (NC) — Wide discrimination against Catholics in Northern Ireland to the point of equating their situation to that of the Negro in the United States was reported by a news team assigned by the London Times to investigate charges made by a prominent Irish architect.

Prof. Geoffrey Copcutt, who formerly headed a design team to lay out a new city to be called Craigavon, 20 miles south of Belfast, resigned from his post in 1964 in a disagreement over the location of the new municipal development.

In 1963 the Northern Ireland government turned a deaf ear to pleas of the historic city of Londonderry to concentrate the new development there. Londonderry is 87% Catholic with a staggering amount of unemployment and resultant poverty. Craigavon is in an area largely Protestant.

The architect, now visiting Andrew Mellon professor of urban design and architecture at the Carnegie Institute of Technology Pittsburgh, Pa., said he was told by a source close to the Northern Ireland cabinet that the government would not countenance any plan that would upset the voting balance between Protestants and Roman Catholics in the capital area.

Church Burning Protested

Jammu, India — (NC) — The Christian community here held a procession to protest the burning of a Catholic and a Protestant church in Sri Nagar on June 7 by a Muslim mob demonstrating against Israeli "aggression" in the Middle East.

The procession culminated in a public meeting where speakers condemned the burning of the churches and the arson and looting committed by antisocial and anti-national elements. They demanded severe punishments for the culprits and urged the Indian government to order an inquiry into the incident.

Earlier at a meeting of Christians, Prem Nath Dogra, a Hindu leader and local president of the anti-missionary Jan Singh Party, had called for a judicial inquiry into the attack and an investigation by the central government.

Kashmir States chief minister, G.M. Sadiq, had earlier announced that the government was granting \$20,000 for reconstruction purposes.

Summer Classes At Nazareth

About 700 students are on the Nazareth College campus this summer. While 50 percent of them, lay and religious, are from the Rochester area, a number of the students come from other parts of New York State, especially the metropolitan area, as well as from five other states, Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and New Hampshire, and four foreign countries, Bermuda, Canada, India, and Thailand.

Included in the number are about 100 in special groups—The Theology Institute for Lally, which began on July 5, and a group of high school girls and boys in an enrichment seminar which will continue through July.

Undergraduates from 33 colleges other than Nazareth are included in the summer session. This year the program is definitely educational—a larger number of men are on campus than in prior years.

Pope Receives Israel Envoy

Vatican City — (NC) — Pope Paul VI received in private audience Israel's ambassador to Italy, Ehad Aveler (July 5). No comment on the ambassador's visit was released by the Vatican.

According to press reports coming from Baghdad, Iraq, and Cairo, Egypt, both Iraqi President Abdel Karim Arif and President Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic (Egypt) have sent messages to the Vatican in connection with the Middle East situation. As is normal in such cases, the Vatican has no comment on the reports.

Irish Lally Too Dependent

Limerick, Ireland — (NC) — An Irish lay leader criticized the Irish lally for being too prone to look to the bishops and clergy for leadership in secular affairs and for thus displaying a lack of self-confidence and moral courage.

The criticism was made by Vincent Grogan, supreme knight of the Knights of St. Columbanus, a fraternal organization similar to the Knights of Columbus, in the U.S.

Grogan spoke at the annual meeting of the organization's supreme council, the first open meeting since the Knights were founded in 1915.

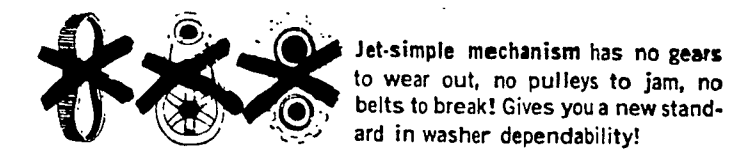

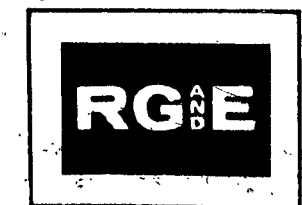

New York — Sidney Poitier, the Academy Award-Negro actor who admits one-and-a-half years of education, dramatically to the teaching power of films before an audience of 100,000, priests and lay people.
