## Playboy Bunnies and Bishops Just Don't Go Together, Hugh

Davenport, Iowa —Hugh Hefner's "gracious invitation" to Catholic Bishop Gerald O'Keefe "to become a Playboy Club keyholder" has been declined.

The invitation, and the turn-down, were revealed in a "Dear Hugh" letter published in "The Catholic Messenger," Davenport's diocesan newspaper.

Playboy Clubs International had offered to the president of The Catholic Messenger, Inc., a \$50 club key for half price, apparently unaware that the "president" was a bishop. With tongue in cheek, staff writer Edward Walsh replied to Hefner, founder of the Playboy empire:

"I am sorry to report, Hugh, that your most generous invitation has been declined. There are several reasons compelling us to this regrettable decision.

"To begin with, Hugh, your letter of invitation starts off quite awkwardly. It is addressed to 'Dear Sir' when, quite properly, it should have been addressed to 'Your Excellency.' I think you will agree that such an elementary gaffe is not become one who boasts, as you do so often, of being 'with it.' Surely, one who has just published interviews with such exalted personages as Harvey Cox, Bishop Pike, and the Rev. Howard Moody must have picked up some of the churchly lingo we still use."

But there were more serious reasons why, Walsh wrote, Bishop O'Keefe had to pass up Hefner's offer of "a world high lit by the soft, flickering glow of open-hearth fireplaces . . . the attentive rustle of

beautiful Bunnies" and a total effect "not unlike a cocktail party staged in the plushiest of bachelor apartments."

There was, for instance, the almost insurmountable problem that would be presented at the Playboy Club door, where, Hefner promises, "the Door Bunny, first of many lovely girls who will tend to you during your visit, warmly greets you and your guests, and checks your key. . . . You also note, with a certain satisfaction, the click as your engraved nameplate is snapped into place on the 'At the Playboy Club Tonight' board in the lobby. By consulting this board you observe at a glance which of your friends and associates are already enjoying themselves at the Club."

Lubbock, Tex. —(NC)—One of the world's largest cotton processors engages in racial discrimination and unfair labor practices against union members, according to a hearing examiner for the National Labor Relations Board.

Examiner Alba B. Martin said the Farmers' Cooperative Commission threatened union members with loss of their jobs if they went on strike; promised non-striking employees permanent jobs; encouraged employees to vote out their union; promised raises if the union was voted out and questioned employees about their union activities and their intentions to strike.

Miss Martin also reported that two members of the union negotiating committee — both skilled Mexican-Americans — were assigned to menial outside jobs in "bitterly cold weather in reprisal against the union and against these two men for

About 100 union members have stayed out an additional 350 seasonal workers, hired in the peak period from September to February, also stayed away. The company normally employs 550 workers at this time.
