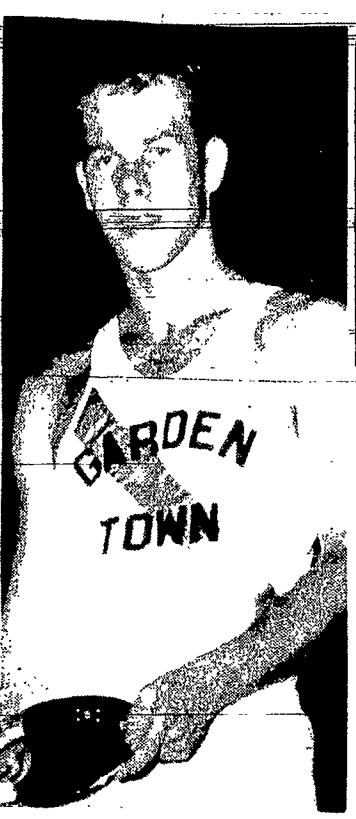

## Laymen Consulted On Parish Boundaries

Webster, Mass. — (RNS) — Laymen, for the first time, have been asked to join the pastors of five Roman Catholic parishes in the Diocese of Worcester in establishing new parish boundaries.

The invitation was issued by Bishop Bernard J. Flanagan of Worcester and was the direct result of a fire which destroyed a rectory in one of the parishes.

Four days after the fire, Msgr. James I. Mitchell, the 80-year-old pastor, died suddenly. Doctors discounted any relationship between the pastor's death and the fire. However, one doctor said, "Heartbreak can be a terrible thing."

The five parishes involved in the discussions are located in the twin-town area of Webster and Dudley. The towns are situated about 15 miles south of Worcester near the Massachusetts-Connecticut border.

Only one of the five, St. Louis, is a territorial parish. The four others serve national groups: two French-Canadian one Polish, and one Slovak.

Five representatives of each parish and the five pastors will meet with Bishop Flanagan to discuss the future pastoral life of the area," the prelate said.

## Aquinas 'Golden Guard' Defends State Title

Perhaps if some inspired journalist wished to convey the spirit of the Aquinas Institute color guard routine in terms of color, "precisoned purple polka-dot" might be the result. But, despite that "imaginative" thought, the near-perfect synchronization and military-like marching of the Aquinas crew has no color equivalent.

However, when the Catholic high school group defends its 1966 state championship title tomorrow, Father John Whitley's boys will have a color uniquely theirs, since, to put it poetically: "All oft-beaten opposition has come to know, that trophy-winning gold is the color most appropos."

The reasoning behind the choice is simple. Over the last two years Aquinas' "golden guard" has secured a first place award in every competition it has entered in with the exception of two. Statistically, that means 20 victories in 22 contests.

When they travel to Buffalo tomorrow to defend their state title, the Dewey Avenue lads hope to crown their phenomenal record of success with a victory which would establish Aquinas as the only school ever to win back-to-back state championships.

The man responsible for the "golden guard's" success is its coach, Father John Whitley, who organized a competitive color C.S.B. The dedicated priest or guard at Aquinas five years ago, and developed the victory habit almost instantly.

The Basilian padre credits the "tremendous cooperation and hard work" of his 17-man contingent as being the differ-

ence between mediocrity and supremacy.

After tomorrow's competition, the color guard will continue to practice three nights weekly in preparation for the national contest in Boston at the end of August.

It goes something like: "We're number one."

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## Fr. Kennedy Named Dean At St. Bona

St. Bonaventure, N.Y. — The Rev. Maurus Kennedy, O.F.M., who rejoined the St. Bonaventure University faculty in September, 1965, has been named Dean of the School of Business, the Very Rev. Reginald A. Redlon, O.F.M., University president, announced this week.

He is the son of Mrs. Margaret T. Kennedy, formerly of 239 E. Second St., Corning, and the brother of John P. Kennedy of 3 S. Elm, Corning.

Father Kennedy succeeds the Rev. Fidelis O'Rourke, O.F.M., who came to Bonaventure in 1949, first as chairman of the business department and then, when it became the School of Business, Father O'Rourke has been named dean emeritus.

A native of Corning, Father Kennedy entered the Franciscan Order in August, 1935. He was ordained a Franciscan priest in Washington, D.C., on June 9, 1941. While studying for the priesthood, Father Kennedy was graduated from St. Bonaventure in 1938 with a B.A. degree.

## Church Land Given Poor

Bogota — (NC) — Bishop Giulio Franco Arango of the rural Duitama diocese has become the first Colombia bishop to donate his diocese's lands to the government's land reform agency, the Colombian Institute of Land Reform.

The young prelate—he was consecrated a bishop only two years ago—traveled from Duitama to the capital of Bogota (July 15) to announce his move at a televised ceremony at the Ministry of Agriculture.

"The encyclical 'On the Development of Peoples' states that 'private property is not an absolute and unconditional right for anyone when others are in need,'" said the bishop, blinking into the unfamiliar glare of the television lights.

## Con-Con Tackles Blaine Proviso

Albany—New York's Constitutional Convention comes to grips with the controversial Blaine Amendment this week and those who want it removed insist "moral and legal arguments are overwhelming" for replacing it with the "logical" reliance on the U. S. Constitution to preserve the separation of church and state.

The convention, which has been advised by a Committee on Bill of Rights and Suffrage to remove the Blaine from the new document, also will be asked to incorporate permission for citizens' suits in courts to challenge laws they claim go beyond constitutional limits in helping children in non-public schools.

These convention decisions shatter the two major arguments raised by opponents of the Blaine Amendment, which was written into the state law in 1894 and has remained as a major barrier to equal treatment for children attending non-public schools.

The debate in New York about education, public funds, pupil benefit and the Federal First Amendment's incorporation into the New York State Constitution, is a hearty echo of another debate which has been going on in the 1960's throughout the nation.

This national debate has been resolved by federal legislation and a high court decision that would favor a New York repeal of the Blaine and reliance on the Federal Constitution through the adoption of the First Amendment's working and a specific permission for citizens' suit challenging constitutionality of legality of certain measures.

There is little doubt, the proponents for repeal of Blaine have been that the national Congress has wrestled with this issue, as have the courts, and its decisions sustained by the court have come in the forms of public laws, offering aid to all.

Among these laws are: The National Defense Education Act of 1958; the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963; The Higher Education Act of 1965; and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

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
