K. of C. Deputy Calls For Renewal

At a meeting of all Grand Knights and District Deputies of the Knights of Columbus in New York State, held in Monticello, New York on Sept. 8, James E. Foley, State Deputy of the New York State Council Knights of Columbus called upon the entire membership of his organization to enter into a re-

newal of community spirit in order to help solve and alleviate many of the inadequacies with which today's society is faced.

Speaking before the leaders of the 385 Councils in the State of New York, representing a membership of 127,000, Foley reminded the audience that the Knights of Columbus was born during a period of religious and ethnic discrimination and hatred. The spirit that gave rise to the foundation of our order, he continued, must be renewed today in order to assure all of our people an equal opportunity which is demanded by Christian justice and our constitution.

Mr. Foley called upon the membership to participate in the anti-poverty program in the various committees throughout the State so that the talents of the Knights of Columbus might be utilized and so that the management of these programs would not fall into detrimental and self-seeking hands. He further stated that it is necessary for all those who have belief in God and a love of country to assume the leadership that is needed in the world today.

Ford Fund For 7 Nuns

Cleveland — (RNS) — Seven Roman Catholic nuns will work here for a year to improve understanding and communication between the city's ethnic groups and Negroes.

The Sisters will be housed and headquartered at the Cleveland diocese-operated St. John College under a \$200,000 grant from the Ford Foundation to the National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice and the American Council for Nationalities Service.

The team will train local leaders among racial and ethnic groups.

Matthew Ahmann, executive director of NCCIJ, and Robert Goldfarb, director of the nationalistic service, developed the program in a series of meetings here with Cleveland civic and educational leaders.

Research professors for all Cleveland universities and colleges met this summer under the direction of St. John College president Msgr. Lawrence P. Cahill and Ursuline Sister Maureen, chairman of the Sisters Senate.


'Seed Money' For Housing

Cleveland — (RNS) — The Roman Catholic Diocese of Cleveland, through a non-profit corporation formed earlier this year, is sponsoring the largest housing rehabilitation yet announced for the Hough area, scene of last year's bitter and tragic race riots.

It has guaranteed \$500,000 in "seed money" to anchor government loans and make possible a five-block, \$5.3 million rebuilding and building program. A total of 598 modern apartment units will be provided with one, two, three, four and five bedrooms. Rents—some of which will be paid through the U.S. government's rent supplement program—will run from \$83 to \$120.

The 28th annual Dahlia Show will also be a feature presentation. This is sponsored by the Rochester Dahlia Society and will be open to the public at the Museum from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Muffin Mix Buffet Bread

Recipe adapted by Ann Pillsbury
2 packages RED STAR Active Dry Yeast
¾ cup warm water
9½-ounce package (2 cups) Pillsbury Golden Corn Muffin Mix
3½ to 4 cups Pillsbury's BEST All Purpose Flour
10½ ounce can condensed cream of vegetable soup

Gradually stir in remaining flour to form a stiff dough. Knead on floured surface until smooth, about 1 minute. Cover; let rest 15 minutes.

Divide dough in half. Roll each portion on floured surface to a 10 x 6-inch rectangle. Cut each portion crosswise into ten strips 1 inch wide. Place in two greased 10 x 6-inch pans. Pour ¼ cup melted Butter over each loaf and sprinkle with reserved muffin mix. Cover; let rise in warm place for 30 minutes. Bake at 375° for 20 to 25 minutes. Remove from pans immediately.

Summer alas seems to be fleeting. That nip in the air calls for heartier meals, and hotter ones too. A good thick soup such as Minestrone will surely hit the spot. The name, by the way, is derived from the Latin, "to hand out." Long ago, when monks tended the needs of weary travelers, this great soup was the staple food kept ready on the fire. Here's a recipe from Prince which retains all the savor of an old favorite:

Minestrone Soup

- 1 small onion, minced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tbsp. olive or salad oil
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes
- 5 beef bouillon cubes
- ½ cup diced celery
- 1 cup chopped cabbage
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 1 lb. can white or red kidney beans
- 1 cup Prince Shells (No. 39) Small
- ¼ cup Prince Parmesan Grated Cheese

Saute onions and garlic in oil until soft. Add tomatoes, bouillon cubes, 1½ quarts water, celery and cabbage. Bring to a boil and simmer about 30 minutes until vegetables are tender. Add seasonings, beans and Prince Shells and simmer 5 to 10 minutes more. Stir in Grated Cheese and serve. Serve 4-6. (Recipe may also be doubled.)




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
