

# McQuaid Hangs On for 26-20 Win Over Kings

Some huge sighs of relief were in order last Sunday at Aquinas Stadium when the final gong sounded on McQuaid's 26-20 victory over Bishop Kearney.

The Knights, who had been breezing on a 13-0 lead early in the game, had just finished their third goal line stand against the never-say-die Kings and, thanks to key plays by defenders Bob Comparato and Bill Cutler, had kept them from pulling out a dramatic last second win.

The game was in its last 95 seconds when Kearney launched its final bid, starting on the McQuaid 44. Four straight pass completions by Jim McGrath covered 37 yards and there are still 45 seconds left as the Kings went into a third-and-one situation on McQuaid's 7. Comparato, one of four Knights who played the entire game, broke

through then to nail McGrath for a 4-yard loss as he attempted to skirt right end. With no time out remaining to them, the Kings went to the air for their last try, but Cutler penetrated from his linebacker's post to bat the ball down just as McGrath let fly.

That final pass was the thirty-fifth thrown by the Kings, and their 20 completions, split evenly between McGrath and Mike Knope, accounted for 285 yards. That statistic explains why McQuaid had to stop Kearney on the 4 just before half-time and on the 8 early in the third quarter. The Knights did it the first time when Bill Marshall blocked one of Knope's passes. A clipping penalty killed the Kings on their second long drive.

McQuaid, by contrast, got inside the Kearney 10 four times and scored each time. Bob DiPaola went all the way on a 50-

yard reverse play 4 minutes after the opening kickoff. Four minutes later, Bob McRae made a diving endzone catch on Nick Comb's pass for McQuaid's second score.

DiPaola's second breakthrough, a 47-yarder, set up his short TD score in the second period, a pass interception by Gary Astles set up Mark Welt's 5-yard score in the last quarter.

That was about all the economical McQuaid offense managed, leaving the Kings to move the ball for a total of 309 yards the rest of the time. Kearney's first score was a stunner, coming on a long diagonal pass from McGrath to Knope, who somehow escaped four McQuaid tacklers in the secondary and hit paydirt on a 72-yard play.

Knope also got the second TD, banging over center after end Dennis Fitzpatrick's pass catch carried to the 1. Fitzpatrick got Kearney's last 6-point-

er on a 20-yard pass from McGrath with 3 minutes left. Kearney's Rick Curro turned in an outstanding job of running on punt and kickoff returns and as a pass receiver in the Kings' wide-open offense. For McQuaid, DiPaola's 116 yards and the 48-minute jobs of Comparato, Paul Rayburn, Welt, and Marshall were individual highlights.

This Saturday, McQuaid meets a new opponent in Whitesboro Central. Game time at Utica's Notre Dame field is 1:30. Kearney has one of its toughest assignments on Friday night in a game at Erie Prep.

In other action last week, McQuaid's J.V. team shut out Aquinas, 13-0, on touchdowns by Mike Ryan and John Quinlisk and the Knights' frosh were themselves shut out, 14-0, by the Littlest Irish.

Corning East dominated the first half, getting away to a 19-0 lead, and stretching it to 19-0 on Dana Eckel's 52-yard gallop in the third period.

At this point, Notre Dame began to look like a new ball club. John Harris went to the air and with Fran Pirozolo's running threat ND was off to the races. First, Pirozolo scored on a six yard run with Duke Carroll adding the extra point.

On the second drive Harris hit Baker four successive tries for a total of fifty-two yards. Then Pirozolo cracked over from the two with Carroll again adding the extra point.

On the next set of downs Harris connected to Baker on a beautiful twenty-six yard touchdown pass. Notre Dame had come back all the way to the lead 21-19.

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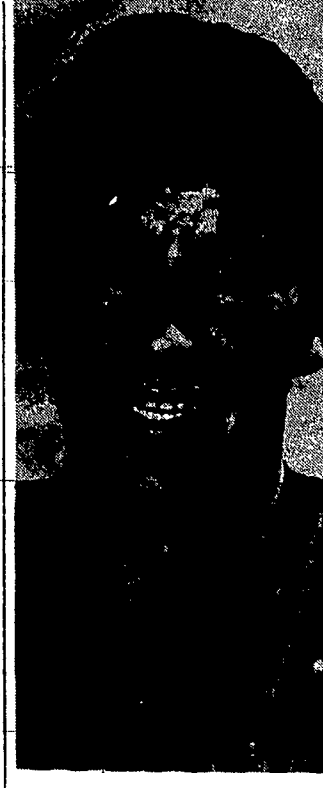
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## Soccer Star
