

## Sayre's Interceptions Beat Notre Dame, 14-0

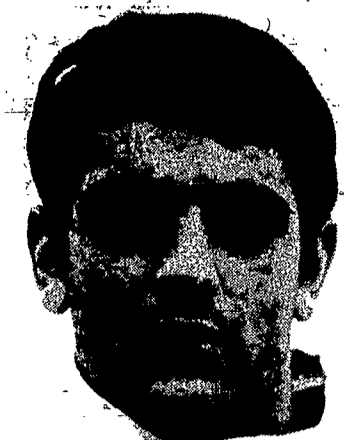

The Notre Dame Crusaders met the Sayre Redskins, Friday night at Notre Dame, in what was supposed to be a clash of a strong defense (ND) against a high scoring offense. Notre Dame won this battle but Sayre

took the war on two pass interception touchdowns 14-0. Notre Dame, playing without the service of all-city Captain Bill Baker, held the Sayre offense well, giving up big yardage on the ground but always holding in the clutch.

Sayre scored first on an intercepted John Harris pass. Dave Rich gathered in the ball at the seventeen and scored, with Mike Werheiser running the extra point. Don Greenwood then picked off a deflected Harris aerial at the 32 and could have walked to the end zone. Werheiser then booted the pigskin over for the extra point.

Sayre, now 5-0, going down the stretcher to an undefeated season. The Crusaders are an injured 1-3. Notre Dame meets Elmira Free Academy, in a big intra-city match Saturday night at Notre Dame. It will be homecoming for the Crusaders.

The ND Jayvees dropped a 38-20 decision to Southside on Saturday, October 7. Greg Hamilton scored two touchdowns for Notre Dame to go along with Jim Leonard's one. Jim Leahy and Harry Backer scored the two extra points.

Erie, Pa. — Erie Prep took advantage of the breaks and handed Bishop Kearney its fourth loss in as many games, 39-19 last Friday night.

Erie scored first on an eight yard run by Jerry Misud. Chuck Britton then scored twice for Prep on runs of 41 and 60 yards to give Erie a quick 19 to 0 lead.

Mike Knope put Kearney on the board with an 82 yard pass to Rick Curro, who went over again in the second quarter to score the King's last touchdown of the first half. Erie chalked up two more touchdowns and had a comfortable 39-12 lead at halftime.

The Kings pulled their defense together and allowed Erie to score just once in the second half, but time ran out on them and Erie walked away with the victory and a 4 and 1 record.

A standout in defeat Rick Curro who ran for 114 yards and caught two passes for 86 yards. He scored two of the King's three touchdowns as he fought in a losing cause.

## Fisher Booters Take Two Wins

Picking up after a slow start, the St. John Fisher College soccer team boosted its record to 2 wins, 1 loss with a 5-3 win over Fredonia State and a 2-1 margin over Rochester Tech last week.

The Cardinal pitchers drubbed 8-1 in the season's opener by Geneseo State's Blue Devils on over Fredonia's sophomore Bob Cupello's assault on the Fredonia goal. Cupello equalled a Fisher record by tallying four times.

Cupello shared scoring honors in the home opener Saturday as the Cards tamed the Tigers. Eddie Mascadri booted the first Fisher goal in the second period to set the stage for Cupello's game-winning clincher in the third period.

Coach Ed Granato's squad will play Utica College at Fisher tomorrow (Sat., Oct. 14) at 1 p.m. In cross-country last week, the Fisher harriers finished last in a pair of three-way meets, losing to Fredonia and Niagara at Fredonia and to Oneonta State and RIT at Oneonta. The Cardinal runners will be trying for the first win of the season Saturday when they play hosts to the Utica College thin-clad.

## Aquinas Hurdles Mooney, Faces Erie East Tomorrow

Coach Bob Rosmarino and his Aquinas footballers (now 2-1) had half their season behind them last Sunday, but most of their hard work still lies ahead.

The Little Irish cleaned up the preliminary stages of the campaign by defeating Cardinal Mooney High School, 20-7, before a rain-drenched crowd of 4,200 at Memorial Stadium. The previous week Aquinas defeated McQuaid, 18-13.

Now comes the dangerous phase of the season. The loaded Warriors of Erie's East High will begin it Saturday, and after burn and Erie Prep. All are powerhouses; all are capable of dumping the Irish.

Rosmarino indicated his frame of mind by cutting short Sunday's victory celebration and

singing the blues about Erie. Although he was satisfied with his charges in the triumph over Mooney, they got no rest from him this week.

He singled out the Aquinas forwards as needing special attention in spite of the fact that they managed to hold Mooney to a -6 yards rushing in the final quarter and to 82 yards overall, compared to Aquinas' 228 yards. A tough break for Aquinas is the loss of center Wayne Bowser who suffered a dislocated shoulder.

The Mooney game statistics showed just about everything in favor of Aquinas, including penalties. It was 11 first downs to 7, 228 rushing yards to 82 and 58 passing yards to 18.

Halfback Bruce Costello snatched over from the eight at 7:30 of the opening period to put Aquinas on the score-

board. Less than a minute later quarterback Rick Parrinello raced 45 yards, dodging five would-be tacklers, to make it 12-0 for the Irish.

In the second quarter Aquinas blocked a Cardinal punt and the ball rolled out of bounds in the end zone to give the Irish a safety.

Early in the second half Kevin DeHond plunged over from the one, clinching a 68 yard march in 11 plays.

Before the third quarter ended Mooney's quarterback John Waffle passed off to lightening-fast Charlie Lowrey who hit Randy Garret in the end zone for the Cards only score. Paul Nealson kicked the extra point.

Tomorrow the Irish will have their hands full handling Erie East. The Warriors were picked

by Roto Magazine as one of the top 20 high school teams in the nation.

According to Roto, "Every major college, including Penn State, Syracuse, Notre Dame, Purdue, Pitt and Alabama is seeking to obtain the services of QB Denny Satschur, the only junior on the 1966 Pennsylvania All-State team. Last year Satschur, a rollout passer, completed more than 63 percent of his passes, gained 1,000 yards in the air, rushed for 600 more and punted for a 35-yard average.

Game time Saturday afternoon at Memorial Stadium is 2 p.m.
