"HONEST ELECTIONS" BILL IS NOT LIKELY THIS YEAR
CONGRESS MAY APPROVE INDIVIDUAL TAX CREDIT

WASHINGTON—In other times it might have been called a monstrosity. But there has been so much balking and flogging on the issue of campaign financing that the "Honest Elections" bill just approved by the Senate Finance Committee is being regarded as a serious proposal deserving most serious consideration.

Having said that, it should be added that there is little expectation that the bill offering a combination of private and/or public financing of presidential and senatorial campaigns will be enacted this year in its present form.

Republicans are lining up against its most controversial feature — appropriating federal funds at a peak cost of \$54 million in a presidential election year to meet the fall campaign costs of both presidential and senatorial candidates. They insist that in view of an impending federal deficit of \$25 to \$30 billion, and with President Johnson asking for a tax hike to head off inflation, Congress should not be dipping into the treasury to meet campaign expenses.

Those who want to end campaign corruption think that giving candidates a choice of private or public financing will go far toward this goal.

The plan is too complicated for quick action, and Congress is approaching the closing weeks of this session. Most likely outcome will be adoption of the private part of the plan, which allows a maximum \$25 tax credit for persons who contribute to a candidate of their choice. Even this would cost the treasury an estimated \$50 to \$60 million in lost revenue.

Extension Society Recruits Here

College and university students of this area, as well as others who may be interested, will have an opportunity to learn about the Extension Society Volunteer movement of the Catholic Church this week.

A team of "recruiters" from the Volunteers — all veterans of the field program — will be at the University of Rochester (Oct. 22), St. John Fisher (Oct. 24) and Nazareth College (Oct. 25).

The Extension Society Volunteer movement, now in its seventh year, has provided more than 1400 young people for one to two years of field work virtually throughout the nation. The work encompasses areas of effort as aides in parishes, in troubled and needy inner city neighborhoods, as Newman center workers, teaching in both grade and high school, and as nurses, both registered and practical.

Those who join the Volunteers receive an intensive six-week training course in all aspects of their work as well as "practice" work in the field prior to going to their assignments. They are paid \$50 a month and provided with suitable living accommodations, an allowance for food, plus health and life insurance and necessary travel expenses.

Those eligible must be at least 21 years of age and have no dependents.

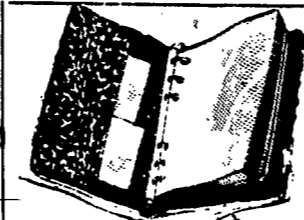
