Blackfriars List Fry Play

What is the truth of man? What are the differences? What is conflict? These are the eternal questions confronting humankind and Christopher Fry answers with a profound statement of human hope in his drama, "A Sleep of Prisoners."

This play to be presented by Blackfriars Oct. 20, 21 and 22 at the First Unitarian Church, takes place in a church where four soldiers are held prisoners of war. The personalities of the soldiers are clearly outlined early in the play; then as they fall asleep and dream, the facades behind which they have hidden their true spirits fall away to reveal that each character possesses the elements of the Diety. Their dreams are Biblical in nature due to the influence of the church in which they sleep. Cain and Able, Abraham and Isaac and David and Absalom are the figures

who walk in the dreams as each man sees his fellow soldiers as the principals in these stories.

The part of Pvt. Peter Able is played by David Brown and that of Pvt. David King by Mark Finn. Richard Mancini will portray Cpl. Joseph Adams and Pvt. Tim Meadows will be acted by Wilford Scott. Director Urban Wegman has skillfully woven this drama of human nature into the real setting of the First Unitarian Church on Winton Rd. S. where the play will be presented Oct. 20, 21 and 22 at 8:30 p.m. Tickets may be obtained at Midtown Copy Center or at the door.

The play will also be presented on Oct. 24 at the Monroe County Penitentiary.

"The Montfort Mission," a folk-singing group of five seminarians of the Montfort Missionaries, will be the subject of Look Up and Live over the CBS-TV Network Sunday, Oct. 22, at 10:30 a.m.

Featuring a concert in which the group performs their own music and lyrics, the program will also include film clips of the young men who are completing their studies at St. Louis University while living in tenements located in some of the city's more blighted urban areas.

"People in tenements seldom sing," says one of the seminarians. "There's really nothing to sing about. You hear music down there—but no one sings. The songs come out of a box. They're all about someone else's dreams and hopes. They describe a world that isn't there. The verses they have written are about, and for, these people. They are the people for whom the seminarians are preparing their ministry."
