'A Modest Increase' for Missions

(This article comments on the report of contributions to the missions on page 13 of this issue of the Courier.)

A modest three and eight-tenths percent increase marked the 1966 Mission Report for the Diocese of Rochester according to Monsignor John F. Duffy, Diocesan Director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

"In 1965 our total receipts amounted to \$559,107, and for 1966 the figure rose to \$580,644," commented the Diocesan Director.

"Perhaps the most notable gain came in the monies sent by the people of our Diocese directly to the National Office in New York, and which were credited to our office," Monsignor Duffy noted. Here the figure jumped from \$51,190 to \$81,796 for the year 1966.

Other gains to be observed for the year 1966 were in the categories of both Estates and the Missionary Cooperation Plan increased from eighty-five to ninety-two thousand dollars.

An item to appear for the first time in the Annual Diocesan Mission Report was that of the thirteen thousand eight hundred dollars raised by a special mail appeal for the support of the mission work of Rochester's own Diocese. Priests on loan to the Archdiocese of La Paz in Bolivia. 'A Bond, not an Irritant'

Minneapolis — (RNS) — An article published simultaneously in Lutheran and Roman Catholic publications has revealed how nine Minneapolis couples involved in "mixed" marriages shared their experiences at meetings that continued over three years.

According to the author, Richard S. Larson, a member of the Minneapolis Board of Education from 1964 to 1967, the object was to learn how to develop a better base for religion in their families.

Mr. Larson, a Lutheran father of eight children, said the participants in the group meetings shared their common religious situation "so that religion could become a marriage bond rather than an irritant."

One by-product, he said, was that the group helped clear up some misconceptions which participants held about each other's religions.

At the meetings, the group would read the Bible, discuss its meaning, try to find a meaningful action which the families could carry out in the succeeding two weeks, study basic doctrine and deal with developments in the ecumenical movement.

"With respect to children, it should be pointed out that all were baptized in the Catholic Church in fulfillment of pledges made prior to marriage," Mr. Larson wrote.

"However, in a brief survey of all couples except one expressed the belief that the father has become the more significant parent in the religious instruction of the child regardless of whether the father was Catholic or non-Catholic."

"None of the children has changed Churches since the group began. Almost all of the children have attended the non-Catholic church several times. Although several had attended only on rare occasions before the group began to meet and a few had never attended the Church of the non-Catholic partner."

Mr. Larson said he did not know whether the program should be expanded or not, although he said it had been helpful to all families involved.

"We see the mixed marriage as perhaps an ecumenical marriage," he concluded. "We hope that such ecumenical marriages may be a sign of future unity in the divided church."

Mr. Larson's article was published in the Catholic Bulletin, organ of the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, and in the Lutheran Standard, official publication of the American Lutheran Church.
