

Kearney, Notre Dame Battle to 7-7 Tie

It was a close battle all the way last Sunday afternoon as Bishop Kearney and Notre Dame of Elmira played to a 7-7 tie.

Notre Dame set up their 3rd period touchdown when they recovered a fumble by Bishop Kearney's Dennis Monacelli on B.K.'s 40-yard line. Quarterback John Harris drove his team to their only TD on eleven plays. The score came when halfback Harvey Pugh sprinted around left end on a play covering eleven yards. Bob Carroll booted the point after to put Notre Dame ahead 7-0 after three periods of play.

Midway in the last quarter Kearney's Rick Curro broke two

tackles on a draw play for twenty-five yards to the Notre Dame two. Quarterback Jim McGrath scored on a sneak up the middle and hard running Jim Cerullo fought his way in for the point after, tying the game at 7-7.

For the second straight game the King's defense held their opponents to less than one hundred yards rushing. Curro for Bishop Kearney led both teams for yards gained with one hundred and twenty-nine.

Bishop Kearney will play their second Catholic league game next Sunday afternoon against Cardinal Mooney at Aquinas Stadium.

Fisher Booters Split 2; Cupello Nets 17th Goal

The St. John Fisher soccer team split a pair of matches last week losing to McMaster University, 1-0, on Wednesday and rebounding to whip Potsdam State, 5-2, on Saturday.

A penalty kick in the final period that eluded goalie Joe Kilonsky was the only score tallied on the soggy Fisher pitch as the more experienced McMaster club dealt the Cardinals their second setback of the season.

At Potsdam and in better weather, scoring star Bob Cupello kicked three Fisher

goals. Ed Mascadri added two to account for the remainder of the Cardinal points. Cupello now has 17 to his credit this season. Kilonsky, Mike Cass, and Russ Hanks continued to lend fine support to the team's effort in both contests. Bill Troy looked particularly impressive in defensive play against the Canadian players.

Coach Ed Granato's Fisher pitchers (now 5-2) will be looking for their sixth win of the season tomorrow in Ithaca when they tangle with the Bombers of Ithaca College.

His Dad Needed a Horse To Go With the Hobbles

Batavia — Ever wonder how some trainers and drivers get into harness racing?

This question was posed to Dick Wilcox, the 38-year-old reinsman from Westerville, O., at the Batavia Downs paddock recently and he came up with a very interesting story.

"My dad, who runs a clothing store, bought a pair of hobbles at a Fair sale, but he didn't even have a horse. Then he went out and bought a pacer named Lady Pauline and we were in business," Wilcox said.

"Our second horse was named Dandy Dick, and I drove him at county fairs. Soon after I made my first parimutuel start, at Yonkers Raceway and won it with Dandy Dick."

"We had Dandy Dick on the trot for four years, with a record of 2:03, then we had him on the pace for 7 more years with a record of 2:02.3," Wilcox continued.

"Dandy Dick died last fall at the age of 23, probably because my dad overfed him," said Wilcox.

Wilcox, a former football, basketball and baseball star in high school, now gets to play a little golf in between his training and driving duties at Batavia Downs where his stable includes Phoebe Victoria, Mr. Steele, Gunsmoke Hanover, Ritzas Mary at county fairs. In addition, he has six horses, Wilcox drives 14 for trainer Frank Mays of Butternut Farm, Silver Creek.

Kearney Captures X-C Win

Bishop Kearney varsity harriers edged Brighton cross country squad 54-48 to take first place in the October 21 Brighton Invitational.

Brighton's Jim Trompeter won the 116-man event, turning in a time of 9:45 for the wet, hilly 2 mile Ellison Park Course.

Two seconds behind Jim finished Kearney's Tom Aman, who paced Mike D'Errico (8), Bruce Velan (13), Jeff Eichner (15) and Nick Habes (16) to victory.

This blue and white victory leaves Kearney's record against Brighton at 2-1, and establishes the Kings' dominance over area cross-country.

Led by third-place Tom Richardson, Pittsford took third in the 16-school race. Eastridge, McQuaid, Irondequoit, and Aquinas placed 4, 5, 8, and 10 respectively.

Varsity B honors fell to Hill-ton runners, who passed second-place Avon 39-51.

B.K.'s Junior harriers took 3rd place, just 4 points behind second place Pittsford. Steve Williams fifth place in the 132 runner.

Bishop Kearney's frosh squad nabbed 2nd place to complete a successful day for the cross-country men. Led by Tim Wilson (3), Dick Kupferschmid (5) and Darryell Youngman (9), the "Little Kings" scored 58 points. B.K.'s second frosh team placed third defeating Cardinal Mooney who placed fourth.
