DE CESARE STANDS FOR:

1. ADEQUATE POLICE PROTECTION. The fear of walking the streets must be ended. This means more policemen to do the job—and on the beat.
2. IMPROVE CITY SERVICES. The City must upgrade the quality of its housekeeping chores such as street cleaning and maintenance and curbing and trash collection.
3. STOP THE SELL-OUT of the City Taxpayer by City Hall. The cost of county-wide services such as the Community War Memorial, Museum, Library and Probation should be shared by all county taxpayers. These functions presently cost City taxpayers over \$1,500,000 a year.
4. PROMOTE CITY-COUNTY COOPERATION to ease the tax load on City taxpayers and obstructionism by City Hall toward the County and break down wall of arrogance between City Hall and the people.
5. NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATIONS should be encouraged, and their counsel sought, particularly by District Councilmen.
6. ENFORCE CITY CODES against bad neighbors, such as New York Central and junk yards.
7. MOVE JUNK YARDS TO HEAVY INDUSTRIAL AREAS. Junk yards are inconsistent with urban living. The ordinances adopted by the Democrats on City Council fall short of the objective sought by neighborhood groups to get them out of residential sections.
8. IMPROVE RECREATION by converting Edgerton Park into a model neighborhood recreation center, providing facilities at 240 school and enlarging recreation site at 227 school.
9. UPGRADE BUILDINGS BUREAU to departmental level with sufficient manpower to guarantee that good neighborhoods don't deteriorate and to prevent spread of blight by full and firm enforcement of the Property Code.
10. IMMEDIATE CLEAN UP OF SUBWAY BED and repair of walls while decisions are made about utilizing it to relieve traffic congestion and improve transportation facilities.
11. BAN HEAVY TRUCKING FROM RESIDENTIAL STREETS and take immediate steps to eliminate traffic jams at Loyal Avenue and Mt. Read Blvd.
12. EFFECTIVE CONTROL OF EMBERSON STREET LANDFILL, a proper operation of City incinerators to end air pollution and immediate cooperation with County on solid waste disposal.
13. PROMPT DEVELOPMENT OF MT. READ-EMERSON AREA into a light industrial park, rather than the vast wasteland maintained by the present city administration.
14. REPEAL OF BLAINE AMENDMENT. Supporters of parochial schools have carried a large share of the education load for too long. As a trustee of my church, I recognize full well the tremendous fiscal tasks faced by the parochial school. They need and deserve help.
15. STOP GERRYMANDERING of Council Districts for political purposes.
16. REPEAL the 25% Water Pollution Charge.
17. ESTABLISHMENT OF GREATER ROCHESTER public transportation agency to acquire, improve and expand bus service in the city and agency to acquire, improve and expand bus service in the city and throughout Monroe County.

My Brother Knights:

On September 26, 1967, His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, our State Chaplain, stated that "the people of the State of New York today can be grateful that the 186 Delegates to our Constitutional Convention have brought their deliberations of almost six months to a successful conclusion..."

"I feel confident that the repeal of the Blaine Amendment was a great step forward. This restriction on assistance for the education of children attending religious schools, which is not found in the Constitution of the United States, has no place in a modern political document. Governor Nelson Rockefeller in calling for its repeal was clear on this point when he said: "We are faced with a situation in New York State where present limitations imposed by the Blaine Amendment can have serious implications on providing the best opportunities for the education of all the children of this State."

"Parents of 1,000,000 New York children may well be grateful that this anachronistic obstacle to good education was deleted from our Constitution by almost three out of every four voting delegates by an overwhelming majority of both political parties and of all religious persuasions... The Convention which closed today has produced a Constitution worthy of the support by the people of New York State."

The Church as a community, through the testimony and position papers of the New York State Catholic Committee, expressed itself on the most vital issues facing the State Convention: human rights, the right of labor, the health, safety and welfare of the people, education, housing and community development. The result of the Convention, an outstanding State Constitution, incorporates every one of the basic positions taken by the Catholic Committee and therefore reflects Catholic social principles and teachings.

Each of the articles of the proposed Constitution met with the approval of a large majority of the delegates. It is deserving of your support as a whole. Therefore, it is our mature recommendation that you and the voting members of your family vote "YES" for the new Constitution on November 7, 1967.
