# Walsh Passing Attack Overcomes McQuaid

McQuaid's new-look offense played Bishop Walsh of Olean even for three quarters last Saturday before the Eagles' passing game took its toll in a 27-13 setback for the Knights, their sixth of the season.

Walsh, coached by former Mooney assistant coach Jim Cleveland, turned loose its brother combination of quarterback Mike and end Dan Metzler and opposite end Mike Hart to rack up 21 completions on 29 attempts, good for 197 yards and the eventual winning touchdown.

McQuaid, by contrast, completed only one pass, enabling the Eagles to concentrate on the Knights' ground attack and halt them when the score reached 13-13 midway through the third period.

With swingback Bob DiPaola sidelined for the season, McQuaid went with a backfield of quarterback Gary Gianforti, making his first start at the spot, tailback Gary Astles, upback Bill Cutler, and swingback Mark Well. That quartet clicked for two touchdowns early in each half. The first saw

Cutler do the heavy work and Astles score from the one. On the second, it was Astles and Well providing the key yardage and Cutler scoring from the 3. When Bob Baker cracked over for the extra point after Cutler's TD, McQuaid was even at 13-13.

The Knights stopped Walsh for one series after that but Metzler kept throwing and eventually found Hart in the end zone for the tie-breaker. A cushion score by hard-running Bill Smith put the game out of reach in the closing minutes.

This Saturday the Knights play their finale at home against Batavia. Game time is 2 p.m.
