## Aquinas Takes Diocesan Title

Backfield speed and excellent defensive coaching were the trademarks of this year's Aquinas football team, which concluded a 5-1 season last Sunday.

Nearly 7,000 fans saw the Little Irish whitewash Keamey High 18-0 at Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

Coach Bob Rosmarino had nothing but praise for his boys as the Little Irish captured their second Diocesan Championship in a row.

Aquinas scored early in the game when Rich Parninello feather-footed quarterback back, streaked 49 yards.

An interception by Don Northrup at the 50 yard line set up the second Aquinas score. Nine plays later halfback Bruce Costello chalked up his fourteenth touchdown of the season when he went over from the four.

Aquinas rolled 67 yards early in the second period after blocking a Keamey punt for their final TD. Kevin DeFond, Mike DiTroia and Costello featured this push, with DiTroia going in from the 1 to tally.

## Inter-Parish Program Wins Nod to Continue

Detroit — (NC) — A year after its inception, the Detroit archdiocese's Inter-Parish Sharing Program has distributed more than a half-million dollars to poor parishes, enabled one to hire a lay theologian, and has been instrumental in providing other social service to needy people.

That report came from Father Norman Thomas, executive director of the program, shortly before the archdiocese's first Inter-Parish Sharing Sunday, celebrated Nov. 12.

Father Thomas said \$474,000 has been put into the sharing fund since the program started in August, 1966, and \$584,000 has been distributed, much of it for maintenance work at poor parishes. Much of this would not have been done without outside help.
