Fr. Bieber At Seminar For Study of Renewal

Manila, Philippines—Missioners, like professional businessmen, are constantly learning and updating their knowledge. Maryknollers are no exception. Vatican Council II indicated the new spirit in the Church, and to learn of this new spirit more fully, and how to put it to use, Maryknoll Fr. Howard T. Bieber of Rochester, who discussed the pastor, stationed in Cateel, Davao, took time off from his active parish to attend a 5-day series of lectures here.

The lectures, given by a team of theologians, covered many new topics. The liberation of Catholic Biblical thought, secularization, new developments in moral theology, situation ethics, historicity of gospel passages, recent developments in social doctrine, and recent papal doctrine on developing nations were covered.

Speakers included priests of the Jesuit and Scheut (Immaculate Heart Missioners) orders, and a local lawyer, Jeremiah Montemayor, who discussed the Federation of Free Farmers and the conditions of the poor in the Philippines.

Father Bieber was ordained in 1958 and went directly to the Philippines, to join the 53 Maryknoll priests and two Brothers there.

Father Bieber, 37, is the son of Mr. Harold J. Bieber, 65 Blvd. Rochester, and one brother, Volmer Pkwy., and Mrs. Ruthie, 73 Alpine Dr., both of Las Vegas, Nevada.

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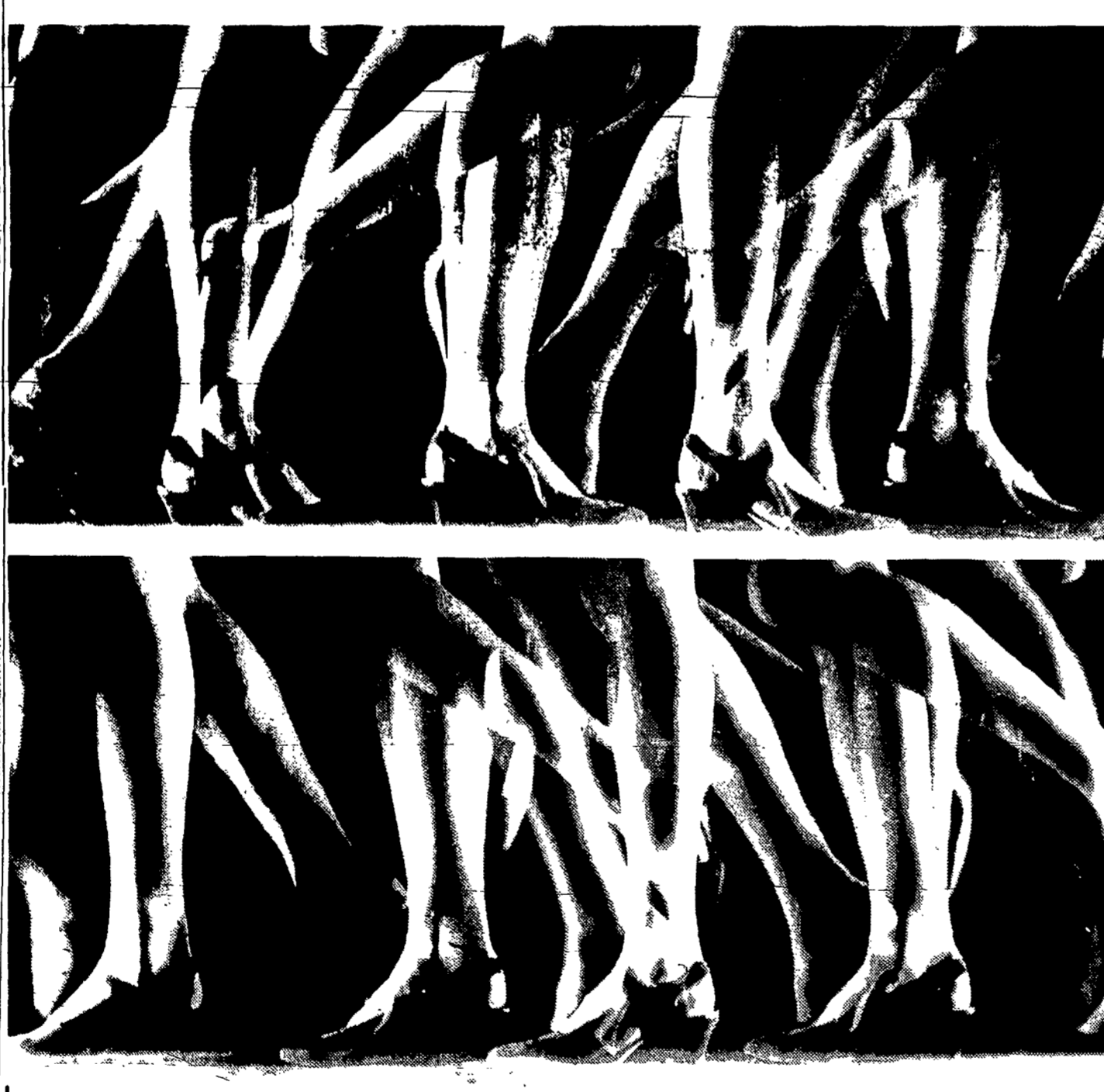
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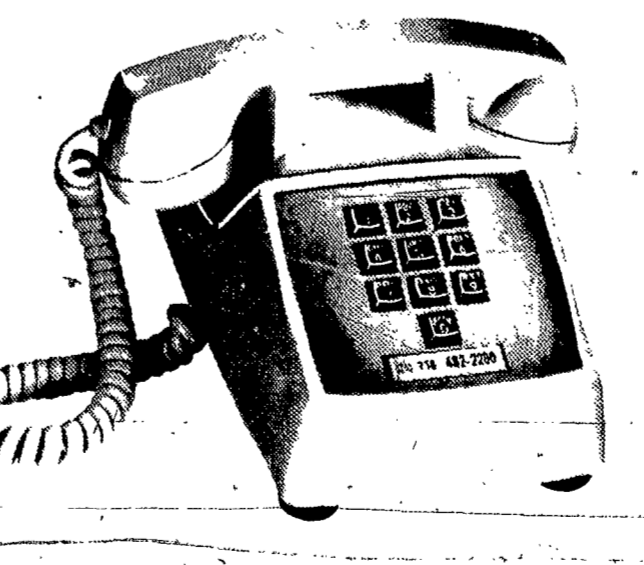
