Violetta Jelley is accompanist for the club. Mrs. Joan Weber is president.

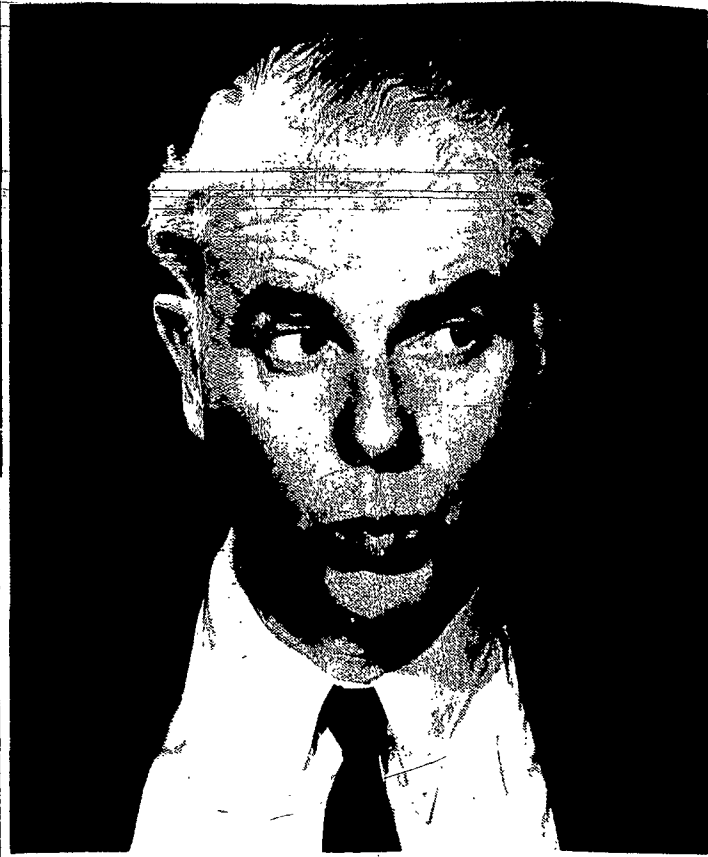
25 Years Ago

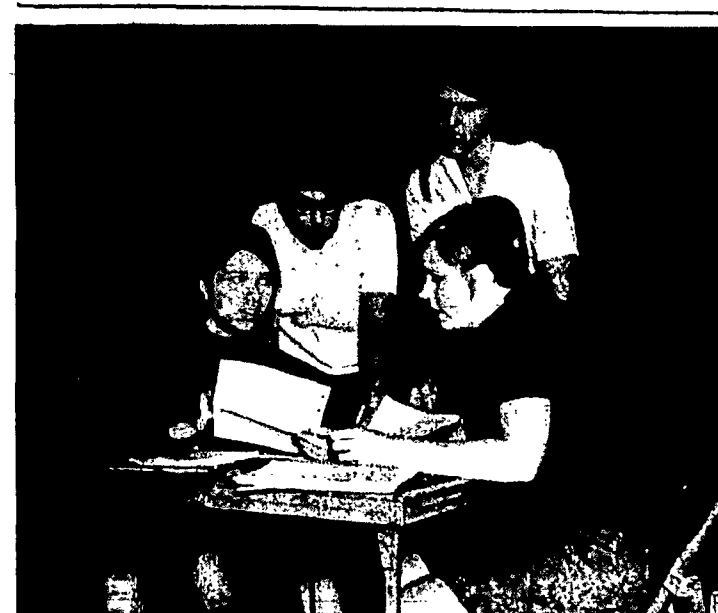
