Calling all dessert lovers! This week we have some dandies for you. Here's our first original recipe in POP Game No. 3. It comes from Mrs. Gerald Murty, a member of St. Augustine's Mothers' Club, and earns 200 bonus points for this group.

Apple-Top Cake

- 1/4 lb. (1 stick) Blue Bonnet Margarine
- 1 box cake mix—white, yellow or spice
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. lemon juice (optional)
- 5 or 6 medium apples, pared and sliced

Pre-heat oven to 375 F. While oven is heating, put Blue Bonnet Margarine in 8x13x2 in. pan and place pan in oven. Mix cake according to package directions and set aside. When margarine has melted, remove pan from oven and stir slightly to coat all sides. Combine remaining dry ingredients and lemon juice, and spread mixture evenly over melted margarine. Place apple slices on top of this in rows and pour cake batter over all. Bake according to cake package instructions. Cool 10 minutes and invert on cake plate.

POP Grasshopper Pie

- 18 plain chocolate cookies finely crushed (1 1/2 cups)
- 1/2 cup Land O'Lakes Butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine, melted
- 1/2 cup milk
- 20 large marshmallows
- 2 oz. (1/4 cup) green cream de menthe
- 2 oz. (1/4 cup) white cream de cocoa
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- shaved unsweetened chocolate

Combine cookie crumbs and melted Land O'Lakes Butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine, and press into 9 inch pie plate. Heat milk to scalding, add marshmallows, and cook and stir till marshmallows are melted. Let cool to room temperature. Add the liqueur, stirring to blend. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into crumb-lined plate and sprinkle with shaved chocolate. Chill thoroughly or freeze before serving.

As a variation, substitute banana liqueur for the cream de menthe. Then you'll have Bananas Pie!

Triple Orange Cake

- 1 cup Land O'Lakes Butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 tsp. triple sec or other orange liqueur
- 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- Grated peel of 1 orange
- 1/2 cup broken pecans
- 3 egg whites
- dash of salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup triple sec or other orange liqueur

Cream Land O'Lakes Butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine and sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, 1 at a time, beating well after each. Stir in 1 tsp. orange liqueur. Sift together flour, baking powder and soda. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Stir in orange peel and nuts. Beat egg whites with salt to stiff peaks; fold into batter and pour into greased 9 or 10 inch tube pan. Bake at 350 F. 45 to 50 minutes. While still hot, pierce cake with skewer around top; mix sugar, orange juice and orange liqueur and pour over top of cake. Cool cake thoroughly on rack before removing from pan.
