To Fight Starvation

New Diagnostic Tool For Hospital

One of medical science's newest and most versatile diagnostic tools—an autofluoroscope—has been purchased and is now being operated at St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira. The machine, one of a total of four in the whole world was designed by Dr. Merrill Bender of Roswell Park Memorial Hospital, Buffalo, after years of research. So complex is this electronic instrument that Dr. Gordon Nigogosyan, Pathologist and Sister William Andrew, Chief Medical Technologist took a special course to become proficient in its operation.

Used for the diagnosis of body disorders and malfunctions, the digital autofluoroscope whose purchase price approximates \$48,000, employs radio-isotopes of wide energy range in making its determinations. Since the autofluoroscope can perform in minutes tests that formerly took an hour or more on a conventional type scanner, patient discomfort is at a minimum. Once the study is done, the information can be permanently recorded on magnetic tape and is readily accessible for later reference.

Serial dynamic studies can be recorded in sequence on tape, which when played back shows the concentration of tracer agent in the organ under study. Pictures of the organs can be divided into as many as four parts to further pinpoint the area of trouble.

Additional advantages of the studies. Re-examination of the autofluoroscope means much less discomfort while being examined. Additionally, it could ultimately result in a saving in hospital cost and in some instances could shorten hospital stay.

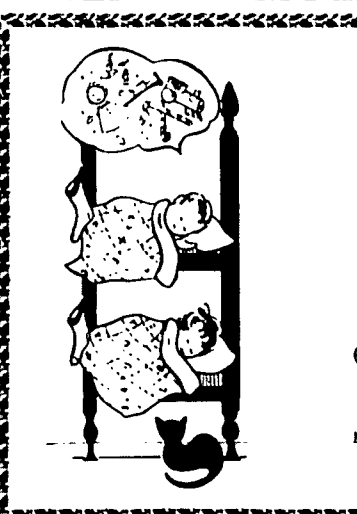

Edison Technical and Industrial High School entrance examinations for parochial and public schools will be held Saturday, Jan. 13, 1968 at 9 a.m.

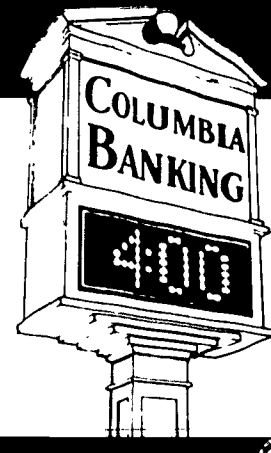
The main entrance on Cliff Avenue is to be used by students who must be in their seats no later than 8:45 a.m. The examination will take approximately three hours.

Three Budding Orators Win Aquinas Scholarships

Three eighth grade boys from the area's parochial schools talked their way to four-year scholarships being offered by Aquinas Institute.

Twenty three speakers, most of them 13 years old, entered the competition last Sunday at the Basilian Fathers' school for over \$2800 in scholarship grants as part of the school's fifth annual Forensic Scholarship Competition.

Gerard Santangelo Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerard Santangelo of 180 Verstreet Dr., Greece, a student at St. Charles School, was the first place winner. He chose as his topic "Civil Rights Demonstrations," and spoke extemporaneously on "Is There Any Future for Communism?"

Second place winner was John P. Donovan, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Donovan of 20 Royal Oak Dr., Gates. He spoke on "A Quest for Freedom" and "Our Nation's Position in the Arms Race." He is a student at St. Helen School.

Third place winner was Craig Van Dongen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Van Dongen of 433 Mill Rd., Greece, a member of St. Lawrence parish and a student at St. John the Evangelist school, Greece. He spoke on "Vietnam—Our Defense for Freedom" and "The Antipathy Program—Is it Effective?"

Santangelo will receive a four-year full tuition scholarship. Donovan and Craig will receive grants of \$720 each.
