

Suggests Rule By Consensus

Chicago — (RNS) — Bishops should "govern by consensus," a noted priest told the meeting here of the Chicago Association of Priests.

Father Andrew M. Greeley, senior study director of the National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago, urged collegial leadership by Roman Catholic bishops, saying they should "not seek to give orders or to impose demands or to make unilateral decisions."

In urging collegial leadership by the bishops, Father Greeley stressed that collegiality should not be confined to the relationship between Pope and bishops.

He gave it a "much broader sociological and popular meaning—the participation of the total membership of a group in the decision-making of the group."

A bishop in the new era of collegiality "proposes the problems to his colleagues so that a collective solution may be evolved," Father Greeley said.

"He does not seek to centralize all decision-making authority in himself," he said, "but rather spreads the decision-making responsibility out as far as he can, in order to obtain the maximum feasible participation of his colleagues so that he may have their maximum possible cooperation in the implementation of the decisions."

Effective authority, he maintained, is not the ability to issue orders, but to obtain consent and cooperation from those whose cooperation will be necessary to successfully carry out the decision.

He called "one-man rule" ineffective and inefficient in a complex society.

If the leader of the collegial body disagrees with the solution advanced by his colleagues, Father Greeley continued, it indicates a failure in the exercise of leadership "because the very nature of the process demands that the solution to a problem be acceptable to all the major points of view that are held in the group."

A recommendation unacceptable to the leader should be bounced back to the group until it finds a solution compatible with the values he leader feels he must uphold, he said.

Diocesan Workers

Ogdensburg — (NC) — Bishop Thomas A. Donnellan of Ogdensburg has announced a new retirement plan for lay employees of the diocese. Details of the plan were contained in a letter sent to pastors and administrators of parishes, institutions and agencies of the diocese.

The plan will provide a monthly income for full time employees based on their earnings up to retirement date. It will be financed entirely by the institutions of the diocese, with no withholdings from employees' salaries.

There are now 384 lay employees working full time in the diocese of Ogdensburg.

Officials Praise Education Report

Lansing, Mich. — A 500-page report on educational finance in Michigan which recommends that the efforts of church-related schools be encouraged, has drawn praise from nonpublic school officials of the state.

Described as the most comprehensive study of school financing in Michigan's history, the study, made possible through a \$2 million appropriation by the legislature, was released here (Dec. 19) by the Michigan Board of Education.

"The report recognizes both the schools are making and the public contributions nonpublic schools are making," said Dr. John P. Choit, president of the Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools.

"These pupils demand consideration in their own right," said Dr. John Vanden Berg of Grand Rapids, chair-man of the board of the Michigan Federation of Citizens for Educational Freedom (CEF). "It offers some sound ideas aimed at improving the financial situation in which nonpublic schools were able to derive only grossly inadequate programs for nearly one-sixth of all future citizens," he added.

"No comprehensive study of school finance in Michigan can logically ignore the state's nonpublic schools," Dr. J. Alan Thomas, director of the study, said in his summary report.

He pointed out that 142 percent of the 2,375,432 children enrolled in elementary and secondary schools in Michigan last

year attended nonpublic schools, the percentage of nonpublic school enrollment in Michigan's total enrollment has shown a gradual decline.

"This change has important financial implications for both the public and the nonpublic sector of education in the state," the report continues.

"If fiscal pressures force nonpublic schools to close or curtail their enrollments, government may need to provide classroom and instructional services for thousands of youngsters previously educated in the private sector."

Officially known as the Michigan School Finance Study of 1967, the report states it is "apparent that the nonpublic schools in Michigan (as in most of the nation) are faced with considerable financial stress."

Student Voice May Grow At Fordham University
New York — (RNS) — If the official faculty organization at Fordham University approves, the Roman Catholic institution will begin a radical experiment on its two campuses here to give students a voice in university administration.

The experiment would entail a Campus Council on each of the school's campuses, composed of nine students, 12 faculty members and seven administration officials.

Dr. Martin Meade, vice-president and dean of students at Fordham, announced the proposal at a Student Power conference at the John LaFarge Institute. The council, he said, "will have complete jurisdiction over all items of business pertaining to the campuses."

The idea, pending final action by the Faculty Senate, would go into operation at the beginning of the second semester. It has already been approved by the United States Government, and Dr. Meade said it has received tentative approval by Fordham's president, Father Leo McLaughlin, pending the faculty decision.

Dr. Meade conceded the idea of the councils is "rather radical," but said he is "quite optimistic at the present time" that the Faculty Senate will approve.

During the conference at the LaFarge Institute, Dr. Meade said the university "must recognize the competence of the student" to have a real voice in university life.
