Nutty Royal Pudding Cake

- 1 pkg. Royal Instant Vanilla Pudding
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- T pkg. yellow cake mix
- 1 tsp. vanilla (optional)
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1-tsp. cinnamon

Mix well the first 6 ingredients. Grease a 10-inch angel food cake pan and sprinkle the mixture of nuts, sugar and cinnamon over the bottom. Pour the pudding cake batter over this. Bake at 350F for 1 hour or until golden brown. After removing from oven, cool for 5 minutes, then take from pan and turn upside down. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar

POP-Lemon Cake

1 pkg. Royal Lemon Gelatin

- 34 cup salad oil
- 2 cups confectioners sugar juice of 2 lemons
- 1 pkg. yellow cake mix

Combine Royal Gelatin, cold water and eggs. Beat 2 minutes. In a separate bowl, place cake mix, gelatin mixture and oil Bent 1 minute. Bake in a greased 9x13-inch-pay at 350F for 45 minutes. Remove from oven and prick whole top of cake with tines of a fork. Combine confectioners sugar and lemon juice and pour over hot cake. Cut in squares and serve warm or cold.



Can A Body Have A Head and No Members?

-Did Our Lord ever encounter sinners, infidels. pagans, atheists, worldlings? He surely did! He even sought them out as He traveled from town to town in order that He might bring to them all a most precious gift - salvation. His very name, "Jesus," means Savior, for He saved men from their sins and infidelities. Did Our Lord live in the lap of luxury and affluence, with a full retinue of servants to do His bidding? No! In the Incarnation, He placed Himself within the bonds of flesh to counteract Lucifer's and man's rebellious, "I will not serve!" He came clothed in poverty and the swaddling bands of suffering humanity, that from His example we might learn His

If then, we were to attempt a synthesis of the public ministry of Our Blessed Lord, it would seem that two words capture it adequately; SALVATION and SERVICE. The Church today must approach the world in which it lives and in which all of us live Nor can we any longer sit back securely saying that this mission is the affair of the Church; the Bishops and priests. Through Baptism we were incorporated into the Mystical Body of Christ. Can the body have only a head and no members? WE are the Church! As Christ took on the nature of a compassionate servant, so must we, devout Christians, become the solicitous servant of humanity, especially to the poor, the




