

### Marymount College Protest Dropped

Tarrytown, N.Y. — Students at Marymount College here called off a scheduled protest demonstration after they received assurance that the dismissal of the college's academic dean will not mean a change in academic policies.

The protest was planned in response to the firing of Sister Vincent, an educational innovator whose tenure in office at the Catholic women's college, conducted by the Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary, was marked by several policy changes, including abolition of final examinations and interdisciplinary seminars for freshmen.

Ellen L. Buddeke, president of the student council, said word of Sister Vincent's departure leaked out before it became official, giving rise to rumors that the nun's removal signaled major changes in the college's policy. As a result, the protest was planned, she stated. But she added, it was also meant to register the students' displeasure with the administration's original lack of candor in dealing with the situation.

Later, student council officers met with Sister Vincent, college president, who gave them her word that Sister Vincent would not be removed because of the academic innovations she initiated. She promised that there would be no interference in academic policy or in the work of the students and the faculty. The students, satisfied, canceled their protest.

"I heartily endorse the innovations of Sister Vincent," Sister Vincent stated. She said Sister Vincent should not be given all the credit for academic changes at the college, noting that many of them had been recommended by a committee appointed by Sister Vincent. She said Sister Vincent's dismissal was for "purely administrative reasons."

Meanwhile, a faculty investigating committee headed by Wolfgang Schanzler, chairman of the music department, recommended the case be closed. Schanzler said the committee met with all persons involved in the incident and concluded that the dismissal of Sister Vincent was necessary to preserve harmonious relations in the administration. Sister Vincent will keep her post until the end of the year.

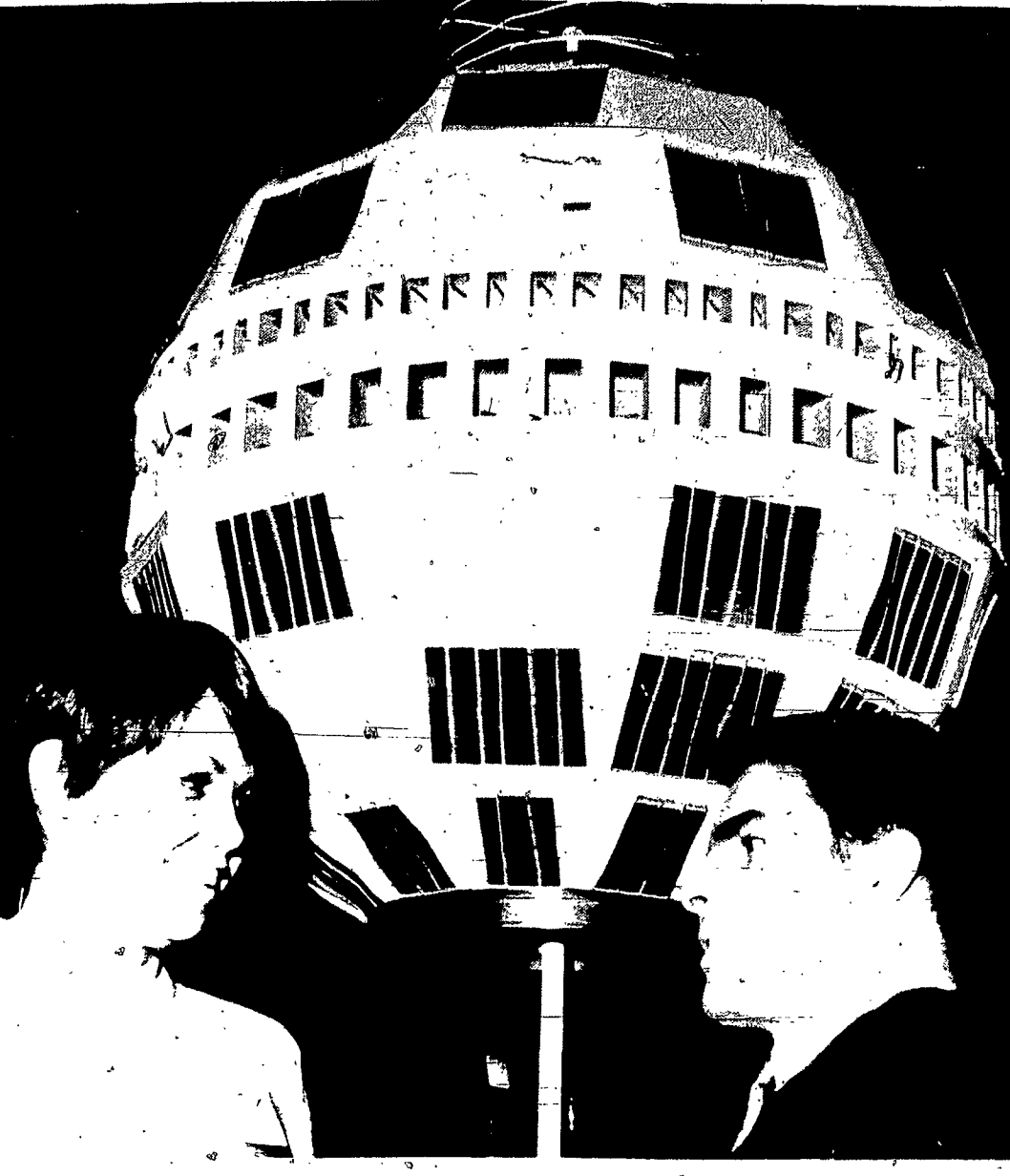

**Catholic Group Merged With K**  
New Haven — (NC) — The Catholic Benevolent Legion of Brooklyn, N.Y., is now formally incorporated into the Knights of Columbus. The merger documents were signed at K. of C. supreme headquarters here by John W. McEvitt, supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus and Alexander Bohler, supreme president of the Catholic Benevolent Legion.

The Knights of Columbus is a fraternal benefit society of 1,200,000 Catholic men with insurance assets of \$300 million. The Catholic Benevolent Legion had about 2,850 members at the time of the merger with insurance assets of over \$500,000.

The Legion, founded in 1881, requested the merger because it found its membership too small to function effectively as a fraternal benefit society. The Knights of Columbus approved the merger at their supreme council meeting in Montreal last August.

The incorporation of the Legion into the Knights has the approval of the superintendent of insurance of the State of New York and of the commissioner of insurance for Connecticut.

**Buffalo Clergy, laity Honored**  
Buffalo, N.Y. — (NC) — Pope Paul VI has honored 27 priests and laity of the Buffalo diocese, Bishop James A. McNulty has announced.

Among those honored were Msgr. Joseph E. Schieder, pastor of St. Andrews Church, Kenmore, and formerly director (1947-61) of the National Catholic Welfare Conference Youth Department, who was named a lifetime associate.

Joseph M. McPherson, general manager of Our Lady of Victory Homes of Charity, Lackawanna, and publisher of Victorian Magazine, named domestic private; and Mrs. William G. Hoffman, treasurer and director of the National Council of Catholic Women awarded the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice medal.

### Top Science Students Are Also Churchgoers

Chicago — America's next generation of scientists — those men and women whose task it will be to shed new light on the wonders of the dawn of space age — have a firm belief in God.

A survey taken at the Ninth Annual National Youth Conference on the Atom held here indicates that 85 per cent of the most outstanding high school science students in the nation today go to church regularly and over half are active in church affairs. They see no conflict between their scientific endeavors and the teachings of their respective churches.

The conference, sponsored by some 70 of the nation's investor-owned electric utility companies, each year brings together some 700 of the nation's most promising high school science students and their teachers for three days of lectures, conference sessions and field trips in which they explore the peaceful promise of the atom.

Such eminent scientists as Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, and Dr. John R. Dunning, dean of the School of Engineering and Applied Science at Columbia University, addressed the conference held recently in Chicago. The students also visited the A.E.C.'s Argonne National Laboratory and Chicago's world-famous Museum of Science and Industry.

The conference, held each year in Chicago, is designed as both a reward for teenage scientists for achievement in the field of science and a stimulus to greater effort in later years.

### Interim Military Vicar Named

New York — (NC) — Auxiliary Bishop Philip J. Furiong of New York will serve as the interim successor to Francis Cardinal Spellman as military vicar of the United States Armed Forces. Bishop Furiong was named auxiliary to the military vicar when he was elevated to the rank of bishop in 1955.

He has traveled thousands of miles in this work with the military vicar in the past. He does not plan to visit the troops in Vietnam this Christmas, due to the complications of planning such a trip on short notice.

### Heart Unit Urges

#### Youth Not to Smoke

New York — (RNS) — The American Heart Association has proposed that the nation's young people resolve in the New Year not to start smoking.

Claiming that the number of young cigarette smokers is increasing at the rate of more than a million a year, the association pointed out that damage to the heart and lungs begins early among cigarette smokers.

"Before becoming addicted to cigarettes," it warned, "the young person should know that a number of disorders — among them heart attack, stroke, high blood pressure, lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and peptic ulcer — are triggered or aggravated by cigarettes."

### On Teenage Maturity

I AM A 18-year-old girl and enjoy reading your medical columns. I hope someday to be a nurse.

I have two questions. First, can a person like me outgrow asthmatic attacks? Second, I did not quite understand what you meant when you wrote in your column, "Young men must always remember that it is impossible to remove the tattoos that they were dared into having in a moment of weakness."

Dr. Coleman explains this. Marcia R. Virginia, Dear Marcia: Thank you for writing to me. I am delighted that you enjoy reading my columns. I am particularly delighted that at such an early age you hope to become a nurse.

I have a great admiration for nurses, their kindnesses and their dedication to patients. I have always felt that good nursing care is probably just as responsible for the recovery of a patient as is good medicine. In fact, it is an accepted feeling today that the nurse and the doctor together make up the health team that is so important in recovery from illness.

You will be pleased to know that today's nurse is trained in the arts, the sciences and the humanities so that she can bring to her patients and to her own family the advantages of this training.

Now let me return to your medical questions. Many patients who were once treated for asthma find that the attacks grow fewer and farther between and then slowly disappear entirely.

I am certain that, with the good medical attention you are undoubtedly having, your asthmatic attacks will come under complete control and will not interfere with your health or with your plans to be a nurse. Now let me explain the statement about tattooing which seems to confuse you. Very often young teenage boys and young adults are dared into having a design tattooed on their skin. Because they would be considered "chicken" if they didn't do it, they submit to what can sometimes be a dangerous prank.

Tattoo needles are often not sterilized and have been known to be responsible for transmitting venereal disease in the process of tattooing. It is for this reason that tattoo parlors have been ruled off the streets by law.

Nevertheless, there are still many places where a young man can permanently have inscribed on his forearm the heart, the serpent and the initials that he later wants to remove. In foreign countries, particularly, tattooing is allowed.

Now the young man grows into maturity and for the rest of his life he has fixed on his skin a symbol of an experience he would rather forget.

I have seen hundreds of people who have had and regretfully believe that almost every one of them would gladly submit to surgery if it were possible to remove them. Unfortunately, there is no method by which this can satisfactorily be done.

I, therefore, warn young men to resist being "dared" into doing something that they will be sorry for.

I hope, Marcia, that you fulfill your ambitions to be a nurse. It is a most rewarding and gratifying profession.

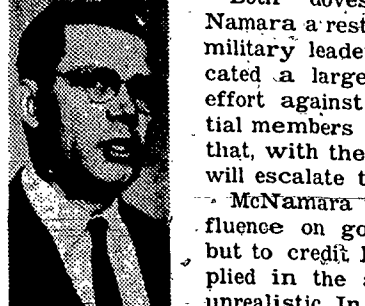
