Zesty Dip

- 2 3 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened
- 3 oz. softened blue cheese, crumbled
- 2 or 3 tbl. coffee cream
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- dash of pepper

Combine cheese with a mixer or in a blender. Add cream, Worcestershire sauce and pepper. Blend well. Chill until one hour before serving time.

Also, after a holiday schedule of rich and fancy meals, you might try the following to swing you back to easier fare:

E-Z, but Delicious Steak

(serves 4-6)

- 1 round steak (about 1 inch thick), 2 lbs.
- 2 carrots
- 1 green pepper
- 1 medium onion
- 1 6oz. can HUNT'S TOMATO PASTE
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 tbl. brown sugar
- salt and pepper

Cut steak into serving pieces and pound with meat tenderizer or back of saucer. Brown in large skillet in a small amount of oil or rendered fat. Cut carrots into small rounds; cut onion in half slices and green pepper into thin strips. Add tomato paste, mixed with water, and prepared vegetables to skillet. Blend in brown sugar, salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for about 1 1/2 hours or until meat is tender. If gravy becomes too thick, thin with additional water.

Is a boiled dinner one of the specialties at your house? If so, try a little different twist. Prepare the meat as you usually do, but when you add the cold water, also add one 12 oz. bottle of beer. (Use a brand advertised in your COURIER). Cook as usual, adding your choice of vegetables—carrots, onions, celery, potatoes, and/or cabbage. You'll find the meat tasty and a little more tender. This works well with beef, smoked ham butt, corned beef and stewing chicken.

Surviving are his wife, Mayme Philipps Crombach; two sons, George R. of Webster and Paul Crombach of Rochester; one brother, August Crombach; a sister, Mrs. Lawrence (Regina) Ryers of Manchester, N.Y.

Mr. Donovan, 72, died unexpectedly Jan. 4. His home was at 100 Selye Ter.

A high mass was celebrated by his son, Father Robert J. Donovan, assistant pastor of Holy Family, Auburn; a nephew, Father Jay Walsh, C.S.B., of Aquinas Institute, and Father William H. Hekey-of-Holy Rosary.

Monsignors Joseph Hogan, Richard Burns, John McCafferty, Girard C. Krieg and John F. Duffy were present, with 13 other priests.

Mr. Donovan had managed a Dewey Ave. liquor store after his retirement from Kodak. His wife, Ann Tschiderer, died three years ago.

Survivors include two other sons, Francis X. Donovan, who served on the city council in 1961, and James P. Donovan of Los Angeles; two daughters, Mrs. Harold E. Root and Mrs. Richard D. Powell, both of Rochester; nine grandchildren and two sisters, Mrs. Francis Walsh of Rochester and Mrs. Carl North of Springwater.

Ecumenical Study Weekend

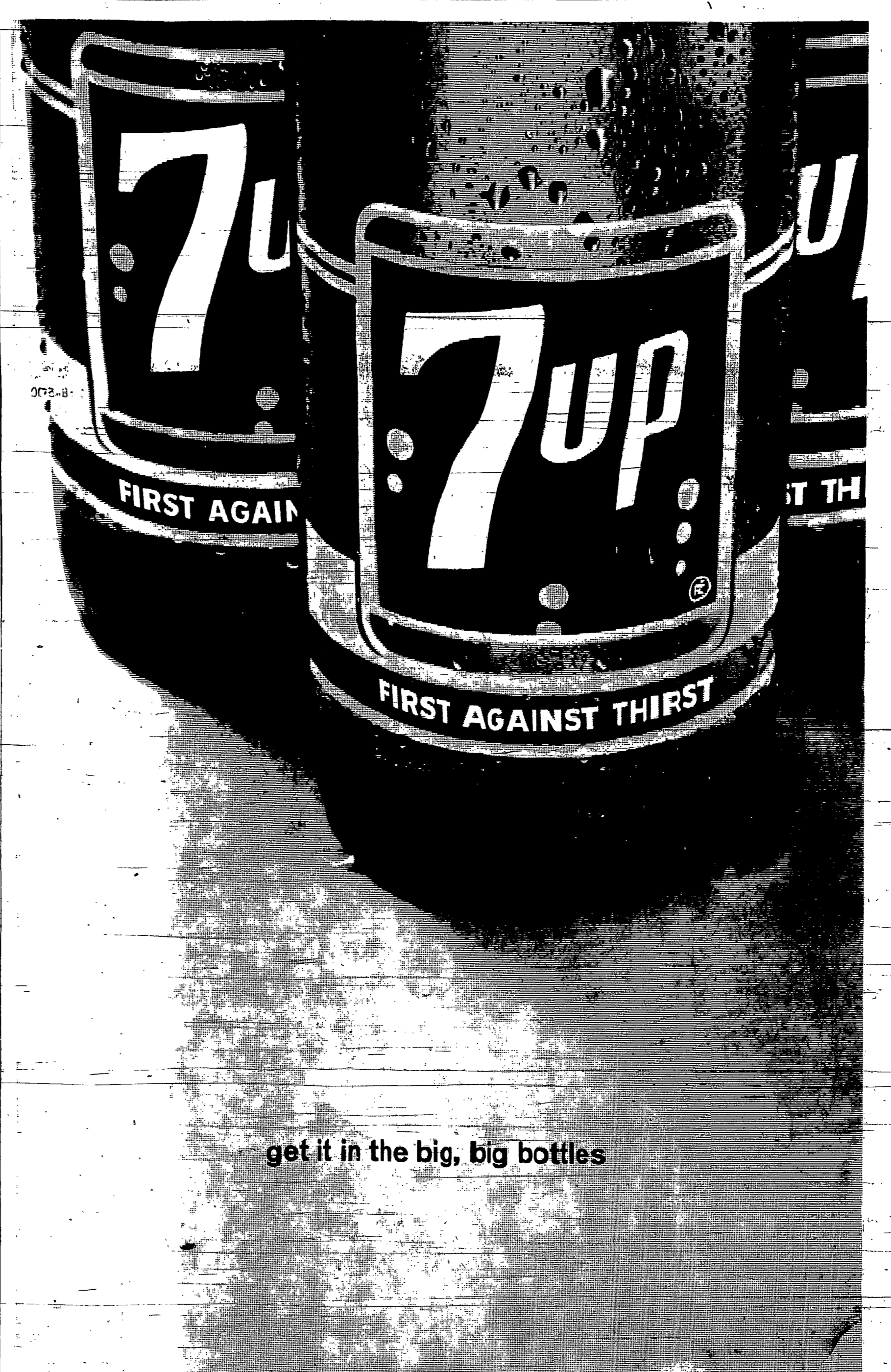
