Youth Mass Music Starts Controversy in Toledo

Toledo, Ohio — The Toledo Diocesan Liturgical Commission found itself on the defensive in a dispute which followed a youth Mass, a gathering of more than 1,000 teenagers in Rosary cathedral here.

"I regret to report that much of the music submitted for the youth Mass would not be acceptable in a third-rate night club. But by wedding this musical trash to religious texts and rendering it at a liturgical ceremony, its promoters are giving it a prominence in no way justified by its merits," Murray wrote.

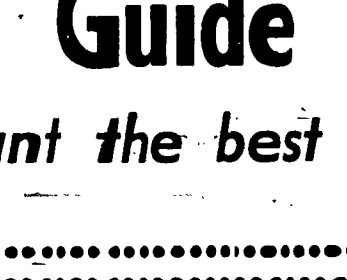
