Have you ever tried your hand at baking bread? If not, start with this plain and easy recipe:

Italian Bread (5 loaves)

1 cup milk, scalded and cooled to lukewarm

1 stick LAND O'LAKES BUTTER

2 pkgs. RED STAR ACTIVE DRY YEAST

4 cups lukewarm water (105-115° F)

5 lbs. unsifted all-purpose flour


Scald milk, stir in butter, cool. Dissolve yeast in 2 cups of lukewarm water; add salt. In a large pan, place flour, making a gua, several nephews. well in the center. Add all liquids, and unbeaten eggs. Mix thoroughly. Place dough on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, Place back in large pan. Cover. Let rise until puble in bulk. Divide dough into five equal portions. Knead and shape into loaves on lightly floured board. Place each loaf into 9x5x3-inch bread pans, well greased. Cover, let rise again in warm place until doubled. Bake at 350°F for 60 mirautes, Remove from pans and cool. Bread is done when a light tap produces


