These Are Your Questions

HOW LONG does it take to recover completely from an operation on the gall bladder, appendix or prostate?
 Recuperation from an illness or from surgery depends entirely on the individual. It is surprising to find that the elderly may sometimes recover far more rapidly than the young, depending on their stamina and their emotional drive to get well.
 I am always impressed by how rapidly women, especially those who have young children, recover because of their anxiety to return home.
 The age, general physical condition and the severity of the operation are all factors that enter into the length of convalescence. It is well-known that some people exploit their illness and remain emotional invalids for many months even though their bodies have returned to normal function.
 Convalescence is shortened because patients are now encouraged to get out of beds within 24 to 48 hours after surgery. This method prevents some of the complications of surgery and acts as an incentive to a speedy return to full activity.
 A week or 10 days after such surgery the convalescence period for the operation itself. The weakness may persist for a number of weeks afterwards and must be catered to.
 The return to a complete work program should not be hurried. Many people pretend that they are back to full activity only to find that they are performing only 50% of their capabilities. Don't rush your doctor into giving you the complete "go" signal.
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Jewish Theologian on Fisher Staff

Rabbi Abraham J. Karp, prominent Jewish scholar and leader of Congregation Beth El in Rochester, has been named visiting professor of theology at St. John Fisher College. The appointment was announced today by Very Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., Fisher president.

Rabbi Karp will teach a course in "Mediaeval and Modern Jewish Thought" during the spring semester at Fisher. He taught at Dartmouth College last semester and also is a visiting associate professor of theology at Jewish Theological Seminary of America in New York City.
 The appointment of Rabbi Karp to the Fisher faculty marks the second time a rabbi has taught there. Rabbi David Z. Ben-Ami lectured in German literature at the college in 1961-62.
 There are tables of predictions by which endocrine specialists can speculate about the eventual size of a child. In order to use those tables accurately, a complete endocrine survey is made. There is probably no more complex or difficult study than the hormonal content of the blood and the urine.
 When there is a known deficiency, treatment can begin and the rate of progress is used as an indication of what can be expected.
 In normally growing children it is said that a boy of nine years of age and a girl of seven years of age have reached about three quarters of their expected adult height.
 It is important to point out that the family pattern of height is a fair indication of the height a child will attain under ordinary health conditions and with good nutrition.
 Parents of small children reflect their own anxiety when their child is one of the smallest in the class. It is likely that he will obtain normal height. It is most important that he be made secure and happy and helped to adjust to his temporary height deficiency. When this is not done, he may grow to be "six feet tall," but be left with a feeling of inadequacy.

An authority on Jewish history, Rabbi Karp is Vice-President of the American Jewish Historical Society and Chairman of its Publication Committee. Among his many publications are "The Jewish Way of Life" (1962), "A History of the United Synagogue of America, 1912-1962" (1963), "New York Chassidim: A Chief Rabbi (1955), Conservative Judaism—The Heritage of Solomon Schechter" (1963), and numerous pamphlets and articles in professional journals.
 Rabbi Karp received a diploma from the Teacher's Institute of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Seminary in 1939. As a magna cum laude graduate of Yeshiva University in 1942 he was valedictorian of his class and won prizes in political science and history. He completed rabbinical studies at Jewish Theological Seminary in 1945, winning the Cyrus Adler Scholarship as outstanding senior student. He is a member of the Board of Editors of "The American Jewish Archives" and the "Jewish Historical Council." He also serves on the editorial board of "Conservative Judaism" and is a research consultant for the American Jewish Historical Council.
 Before coming to Rochester in 1956, he served as rabbi in Swampscott, Mass., and Kansas City, Mo. He is a member of the Mayor's Advisory Committee of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, rabbi of the American Jewish Congregation of America, and rabbi of the Conservative Synagogue of America, Cambridge, Mass., and a research consultant for the American Jewish Historical Council.

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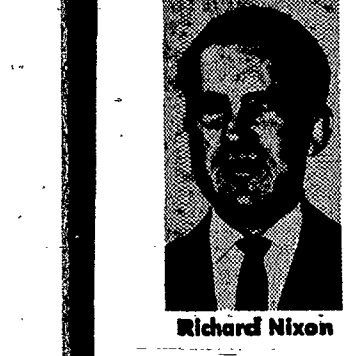
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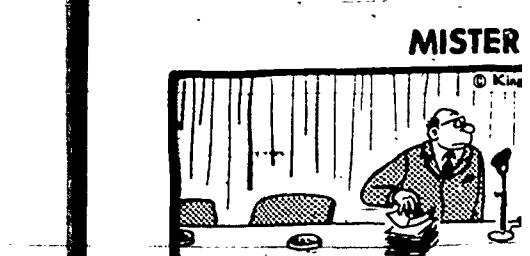

Now and then somebody will suggest that the Church ought to stop saying that to miss Mass on Sunday is a mortal sin that can damn a person to hell for eternity.
 Only recently, a priest elaborated on the proposal in an article in Ave Maria magazine.
 The fact is, however, that the Church never has said that missing Mass on Sunday is a mortal sin, period. Doubtless some pastors and parents and catechism teachers have said it, or have been understood by youngsters to be saying it; but this is simply one more illustration of the fact that communication in the Church like communication anywhere, is vexingly difficult.

When the teaching authority, the magisterium, speaks on a point of faith or morals, it does so with the greatest caution and precision. But what it says is sometimes hardly recognizable once it reaches the popular level.
 Among the causes of our communication problems is the deplorable tendency of the human mind to jump to conclusions about what is being said; or rather about what is meant. Thus G. K. Chesterton once observed humorously that if he

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
