Martin Moll Dies at 88; Prominent Businessman

Funeral Mass for Martin Moll, father of Martin Q. Moll, president of the Christopher Press, Inc., was scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 15 at Our Lady Queen of Peace Church.

Mr. Moll, 88, of 142 Green Knolls Drive, died in Daytona Beach, Florida, where he was vacationing, Feb. 10, 1968.

He was a retired collection agency owner and at the time of his death was honorary chairman of the board of the Christopher Press, publisher of the Catholic Courier Journal.

Mr. Moll who operated the Martin Moll Associates on Franklin St. from 1946 until his retirement in 1966, was the oldest living past president of the Rochester Credit Men's Association. A testimonial dinner for him, next spring, was being planned by the Association.

He had left Rochester Free Academy when 15 to work for the law firm of Adler and Adler as an office boy. The firm later became Adler and Colson.

Mr. Moll represented the firm in cases involving bankruptcy as credit manager and later, office manager. He left to establish his own company. A former 12th Ward Republican supervisor, he was elected in 1927 after nomination by the Citizens' Republican Committee ticket.

He served as vice president of the New York State Conference of American Collections, Inc. in the 1960s.

His wife, Louise Quinn Moll, died in 1945.

Besides his son, Martin Q., he is survived by four daughters.

Slave Labor On Long Island

New York—(RNS)—A special call for state and federal action to correct "slave labor conditions" among migratory farm workers was issued here by an executive of the National Council of Churches.

The plea followed the broadcast of the National Educational Television (NET) network depicting the plight of migrants in Suffolk County, Long Island. The documentary "appalls and shocks the conscience of New Yorkers and the nation," declared Dr. Charles S. Spivey, executive director of the Council's Department of Social Justice. "It is incredible and inexcusable that virtual slave labor conditions for migrant workers still exist in America."

Dr. Spivey called upon New York and federal officials to "enforce existing regulations affecting migratory farm workers," and upon Congress to enact legislation now pending which would give the migrants the rights to collective bargaining under the National Labor Relations Act.

Before A-3 classification was established, A-2 indicated morally unobjectionable for adults.
