

# CYO Loops Ready For Playoffs

Final league games in CYO basketball were held last Sunday, clearing the deck for playoff action.

Senior Jim Brunson led the way, posting a record 23.8 time for the 50 freestyle, a 53.1 for the 100 freestyle and anchoring a 200 medley relay team to a new low of 2:00.8. Ed Shelley, Bill McGraw, and Pete Brunson swam the first 3-legs of the record.

McGraw, senior co-captain with Brunson, also broke the school 100 breaststroke mark with a 1:11.1 clocking. The junior Brunson provided the fifth record with a time of 2:11.5 in the 200 freestyle.

The Brunsons were 1-2 in scoring, Jim leading with 138 points and Pete a close second with 125. McGraw (110), diver Dave Eckl (86), and Shelley (97) also were consistent point men for the Knights in their first season under coach Tom Kadlubowski.

# Cards Cool Knights, 39-32

McQuaid tested Cardinal Mooney's smooth ball club before an overflow home crowd last Friday, but the Cards stayed just out of reach and finally walked away with their 14th decision in 15 starts, 39-32.

The win gave Mooney a final 6-0 record in the Catholic League while McQuaid, 88 for the season, finished second with 3-3.

McQuaid surprised Mooney at first with a sticky zone defense that slowed the scoring pace. With the Cards up by only two in the second period, Doug Farrell, Dick Felber, and Gary Braun suddenly hit consecutive baskets, and the Knights never quite caught up.

McQuaid crept to within a point early in the third session, but Braun and Felber meshed jumpers, Farrell drove through twice, to inflate Mooney's cushion to 9.

Talling 30-22 going into final quarter, the Knights scrambled once more, whittling Mooney's buffer to 4 points with 2:25 remaining. Once again the visitors pulled away, as another drive and free throw by Farrell and four foul conversions by Braun wrapped up the verdict.

Statistically, the Cards notched their winning margin on the foul line—outscored the Knights there, 9-2, and committing not a single personal foul in the whole second half. McQuaid had a surprising 38-23 rebounding advantage but ran into ball-control problems against Mooney's tenacious defense.

On the J.V. scene, it took an overtime for McQuaid to nudge Mooney, 52-51, for its 15th win in 17 starts. The freshmen, meanwhile, dropped a 49-26 decision to Kearney.
