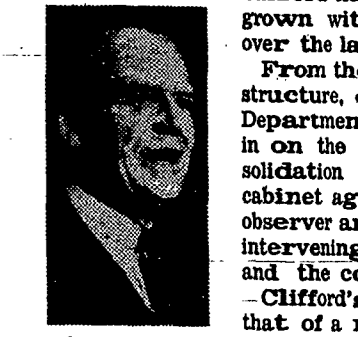

Why? Because I wanted talk with some of the miners. Again why? Because I was newspaperman. What did I want to talk w the miners about? I wanted to find out wh they thought of Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal, the National Recovery Act, the Wor Progress Administration, as all that. The men looked at me for moment. Then one spoke. "Young fellow," he said, think you'd better turn your e around and get out of here. As don't come back." If I got out. I am an advoc of living to fight another d.
