

Intermedia Festival At Colleges

INTERMEDIA '68, a touring festival supported by the New York State Council on the Arts and the National Council on the Arts, will be on the Nazareth and St. John Fisher campuses during March. Five performances are scheduled on the Nazareth College campus and one at St. John Fisher.

The festival is a current anthology of intermedia ideas. Its performers all work environmentally, using space, light, sound and other elements to provide multi-sensory effects.

First performance on Tues., March 12 at 8:15 p.m. will be given by Nam June Paik, a Korean composer who has worked on an international level in electronic constructions, television, music etc. Paik is a composer, an actor, a theoretician, a man who controls his environment and the world through the merging of arts.

Trisha Brown Schlieter, who received her bachelor of arts degree in dance from Mills College in California will give a number of solo dances March 15 at 8:15 p.m. She is an original founding member of the Judson Dance Theatre, a group which was a seminal pioneering influence on technologically oriented avant garde performing and environmental arts of the '60's.

Fisher To Make Philosophy An Elective

St. John Fisher College proposes to eliminate philosophy as a general degree requirement and work out new elective programs.

Father Charles J. Lavery C.S.B., president, announced this week that the change will take place in September if the State Education Department approves. The department passes on all major changes in registered degree programs.

Every Fisher graduate for nearly a decade has had 12 hours of philosophy. The original requirement was 20 hours. The change does not point toward "secularization," the philosophy chairman declared.

Basilian Father Robert G. Miller said:

"In no sense would those few who might opt not to pursue philosophy courses be engaged in secularized liberal education at Fisher.

Saturday's program will be climaxed by a "Fun Night" at the Hospitality House. The weekend will close with Masses in the Motherhouse Chapel for freshmen and seniors and in the college chapel for sophomores and juniors.

St. Theodore's To Share \$20,000 Federal Grant

A \$20,000 federal grant to improve library facilities will provide for an inter-library loan system between the Thomas Edison Elementary School and St. Theodore's Parochial School, both of Gates.

The one-year grant will provide approximately 4,000 books and audio-visual materials to 1189 students, the combined enrollment of the two participating schools.

Edison School will receive all

materials, which will be processed through the area Board of Cooperative Educational Services. St. Theodore's will have access to all materials on a loan basis.

Principals William S. Hodgetts of the Edison School and Sister Caritas of St. Theodore's stress that there will be total teacher participation in selection of materials through planned task meetings. Lists of these materials will be given to all instructional staff.
