## Aquinas Bouts: Exciting, But Safe

The Aquinas Mission Bouts, scheduled for the Dewey Avenue high school on March 22 and 29 this year, are a fair example of high school boxing in this part of the country.

The fisticuff sport has had an up and down history in the United States since the first American championship bout in 1841. In that year Tom Kiken and Country McClosky went 101 rounds, bare-knuckle at that, in New York City. The last gloveless fight (in a ring, that is) was the John L. Sullivan-Jake Kilrain donnybrook, a 75-rounder on July 8, 1889.

Patrons of the Aquinas Mission Bouts will see a card that is exciting, but far more concerned for the health of the boxers than those early days of boxing.

The Aquinas boxers must wear protective headgear every time they put on their gloves, which are 16-ounce models. Months of physical training before the bouts assures top physical condition for the young pugilists.

Frank "Hunk" Vadas, long time director of the Mission Bouts stresses skill rather than brawn in the matches. The aim is to pile up points through technical skill rather than to "kill" the opponent, he insists.

# Mooney Cagers Keep Title

Mooney's powerful basketeers put the lid on their second straight diocesan cage championship last Sunday, with a clear-cut 49-31 win over McQuaid.

The Cards started strong, finished strong, and by halftime threatened to make a rout of it, leading 22-8. The game Knights rallied in the third canto, however, and at one point pulled up to a 27-19 deficit. That was as close as they got, however, as the Ed Nietopski-coached Cards went into overtime and cruised off again.

Doug Farrell led the winners' attack as he has all season. His four early buckets put McQuaid in a hole from which they never really emerged. He was ably assisted by Gary Braun, who wound up with 17 points, only three less than Farrell's 20 counters.

It was a masterful finish to an 18-3 season for the Mooney cagers. Their tough defense stopped the Knights dead in the first half, and by then the Card lead was too big to be threatened. Brad Smith and Nick Combs had 12 each for the losers.

Mooney reached the finals only after a tough battle with Aquinas last Friday night. Aquinas battled the Cards on even terms through the game until the last five minutes. An eight point Mooney string in the closing minutes did the trick, however, for a 53-48 triumph.

McQuaid made the finals with a 75-60 over St. Anthony-of-Padua High School from Watkins Glen. The Knights roared off to a quick 12-1 lead, had the game under wraps all the way.
